closed, and we occupy the second position in the Competition. In the first half of the year we won two matches and lost two, while we have done exactly the same this Term. The first School Match was against S.G.S., who made the large total of 379. After fielding for 41 hours we went into bat and were dismissed for 62. In the next match a reversal of form took place. We made the School record of 670 against Newington College, and O. H. Dean put up a record for NS.W. by making 412. After being in the field nearly all day, the N.C. batamen were unable to show their true form, and a total of 54 was the St. Joseph's College made 376 against us, and at the end of the day's play we had lost one wicket for 201. At the beginning of the Term we had a very promising team on paper, and although we have rarely failed in batting the bowling has been weak. Dent has been the mainstay of our team in bowling, and since Minnett's return we have had no large scores hit up against un Gilles at times bowled very well. He took 5 wickets for 27 runs in the Old Boys' match. Our batting has been ex-

hHE School Season of 1904 has ceptionally good, although the tail of the team should have done better, as usually. when they had to bat, the bowling had been knocked about. Dean has made a Schools' record in compiling 665 runs in the four Competition Matches, and has on three successive occasions topped the century. R. B. Minnett, within a fortnight of his return from Tasmania, made 182 against T.K.S., and two weeks later followed it up by making top score of the match against the Old Boys with 68. Besnard has fulfilled his early promise as a batsman. He has aggregated 206 in the four matches for an average of 41. He also has made a three-figure score. H. Adams has proved himself a reliable opening batsman, and played a good steady innings of 102 against S.J.C. Blaxland, who is the smallest and youngest member of the Eleven, has done some serviceable stone-walling, while Dent has done very well for a bowler. Allen was just striking form with the bat when he received a slight sun-stroke, which has prevented him from taking any further part in cricket since the Newington College match. In his absence Dean has made a good captain. The fielding of the team has been patchy, although Dean, behind the wickets or elsewhere, Gilles, Edwards. Dent and Allen have consistently fielded well.

SCHOOL V. S.G.S.

WE met S.G.S. on the Sydney Cricket Ground on October 21 and 22. S.G.S. made 379. Five wickets fell for 167, but the remaining batsmen more than doubled the score. Keele, who went in tenth, made top score 55, and Garrett 52, Ruse 40, Leslie 37, and Fox 30, all contributed useful scores to the total. Our bowling was never collared at any stage of the match, but each batsman made runs. Only one of the team made under

double figures. The sixth wicket added 59 and the tenth 67. Dean took 3 wickets for 44, Dent 2 for 55, and Gilles 2 for 39. From the bowling

SCHOOL V. NEWINGTON COLLEGE ..

WE played N.C. at the N. Sydney Oval on Friday, October 28, and won by 616 runs on the first innings, and in all 849 runs were got in 6 hours to minutes. Winning the toss we started with Dean . and Blaxland, who put on 61, Blaxland playing a stone-walling innings for 3. The next partnership-Dean and Besnard-took the score to 309, an addition of 248 runs for the second wicket. Besnard showed good form in making 59, his square-cutting being very good. At lunch time two wickets had fallen for 404. Dean had then made 280 runs in 2 hours 15 minutes. On resuming, he batted more quietly, and scored at a rate about equal to that of Allen, who made 61. The third wisket, which put on 95, fell at 404, and the fourth wicket, which fell at 536, was responsible for an addition of 132 runs. After lunch Dean took his score from 280 to 412 in 75 minutes. The whole of his runs were made in 210 minutes. He gave a chance of stumping at 12, and was missed in the field at 182, 237, and 262. The chance at 182 can, however, hardly be called one. The ball was driven back to the bowler at a terrific rate, and, after hitting the bowler's hand, it went to the boundary. He hit 1 five, 76 fours, 3 threes, 13 twos, and 53 singles. O. H. Dean's 412, besides establishing a New South Wales, is also the Australian school record. The Adelaide school record is held by Clem Hill with 360 not out, and the Melbourne record by E. C. Miller, who made 265 for the Melbourne Church of England Grammar School against Scotch College in 1896. The N.S.W. schools' record was broken last year by M. H. Blaxland, who made 213 for S.G.S. against T.K.S. The S.C.E.G.S. total of 670 is also a record, the previous highest being 639 for S.G.S. against S.C.E.G.S. in 1898. Great praise should be given to the N.C.. bowlers and fieldsmen, who throughout the long

Wa met T.K.S. at Parramatta on Friday and Saturday, November 11 and 12, and won substantially by an innings and 243 runs. On Friday afternoon we lost four wickets for 474 runs, which were made at the rate of two a minute R. B. Minnett, who has quickly got into form, made 182. He gave a brilliant display till he reached his hun-red, after which he tired perceptibly, made some uppish strokes and gave chances. He hit 28 fours and 3 fives, or a total of 127 in boundary strokes. O. II. Dean put together 104 in This is the third consecutive school match in which Dean has got over a hundred-his scores being 412, 126, and 104. Besnard also got the century. He took two hours to make 106, hit 14 fours, and gave a chance at 18. The second wicket put on 156, the third 161, and the fourth 106. On Saturday Dent, whose overnight score was 57, was smartly run out in the first over. Of the tail, Edwards made 32 not out by vigorous, though lucky tatting. The total score was 540. For T.K.S., Metcalfe took four wickets and Brennan three, although Godson kept a good length, and bowled, perhaps, the best. King's School in the first innings were all out for 122 (Body 20, Brennan 24, Ryrie 19, Godson and Gregory 15 each). Dent bowled his leg breaks with great precision, and got eight wickets for 41 runs off 17 overs, while Minnett secured two wickets for 9 runs off 9 overs. Following on, T.K.S. did better, Gemmell-Smith making top score 89 by vigorous hitting. In one over from Dean he hit 16, but was bowled by the same bowler n his next over. Bowman put together 3e, and

Metcalfe and Felton made 14 each by free hitting. The innings closed for 175. Dean took 3 wickets for 38, and Fitzhardinge 2 for 21. It is curious that, although twenty T.K.S. batsmen were dismissed, only four of our team were responsible for actually getting rid of a batsman.

#### CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

R. K. ALLEN.—Useful break bowler; good field at point; fair bat. As captain manages his team well. Colours, 1902.

R. B. MINNETT.—A sound and most attractive batsman; scores all round the wicket and is always aggressive. Good medium pace

bowler; comes fast from the pitch. Colours, 1003.

O. H. DEAN.—A very sound batsman, with a variety of strokes; very fast between the wickets; good wicket-keep and fair bowler; has made 897 runs in School matches season 1904, and 1348 in all matches this term. Colours, 1903.

O. G. DENT.—Good leg-break bowler; has been very successful this term; good field and

useful batsman. Colours, 1903.

R. C. KING.—Fair bateman, but out of form this term; at times bowls well and is a relieving wicket-keep.

R. FITZHARDINGE. — Slow left-hand bowler; most unorthodox hatsman, but gets runs; unreliable field.

D. GILLES. — Medium to fast bowler; unsuccessful in School matches, but put up a good performance against the Old Boys; good field; fast between the wickets.

N. H. Besnard.—A good batsman, with a variety of strokes, his square cutting being particularly good; improved fieldsman.

H. ADAMS.—Occasionally bats extremely well; has good defence, but starts badly; very reliable in the field.

F. BLAXLAND.—Rather young player for the first team; very promising bat; fields well and returns smartly to the wicket.

G. P. EDWARDS.—Batsman of the slogging order; good field; returns accurately; may develop into a fair leg-break bowler.

T. Spencer.—Slow change bowler; weak bat and fair field.
