

#### Chapel Notes.

O N Aug. 1, an address was given by the Rev A. S. Webb of the Melanesian Mission. Open Sunday was on August 31. There was a very large congregation. The preacher was the

Rev. A. H. Garnsey, and during the service he dedicated the panelling on the South side in memory of the late Lieut. C. V. McCulloch, and that on the North side in memory of the late

2nd Lieut. K. Taylor; he also unfurled a blue Ensign flag in memory of the late 2nd Lieut. Eric R. Sinclair.

Since our last issue tablets have been placed in memory of J. S. Wilson, E. R. Sinclair, R. L. C. Royle, F. D. W. Oatley.

On September 7, the Acting-Chaplain unveiled the window in memory of the late Major R. R. Brown, M.C. subject is St. Patrick, patron Saint of Ireland. The description is given by the artist, Mr. Norman Carter, as follows: -"The subject is St. Patrick, and the incident depicted is as follows: On Easter Day in full episcopal robes, with mitre and Crozier, St. Patrick proceeded with his missionary band to Hill of Slane and lighted the Paschal Fire on the summit. This was against the royal command of Leoghaire, the Ard Righ, or supreme monarch of Ireland, for the Druids had told him if any fire was lighted before their own sacrificial fire, it would never be extinguished. Leoghaire is seen in the right-hand panet with Druids and menat-arms, interviewing St. Patrick, who is in the left-hand panel. The result of the interview was that the king gave his consent to the preaching of the gospel throughout Ireland. With St. Patrick is the youth Benen or Benignus, bearing the book of the gospels. He was the son of the Chieftain Secsen. Benen had been so captivated with the gospel doctrines that he became St. Patrick's inseparable companion, and afterwards was one of the Comhards, or successors to S. Patrick in Armagh."

#### Speech Day.

NOTWITHSTANDING the gloomy meteorological forebodings of the previous days, beautiful spring weather ushered in our Speech Day on September 11th. After a short service in the Chapel, the distribution of prizes by the Governor, Sir Walter Davidson, took place in the marquee erected on the grounds. His Excellency was attended by Lady Davidson and Mr. F. Lamb, Private Secretary.

His Grace the Archbishop presided, There were also present on the platform, Rev. Canon Sharp, Rev. Canon Charlton, Mr. A. F. Robinson, Mr. A. B. S. White, and Mr. Randell W. Carey (members of the Council), Mr. R. P. Franklin, Headmaster of Melbourne C.E.G.S., and Dr. F. Antill Pockley.

The Archbishop in opening the proceedings, expressed the hearty welcome extended by all to the Governor, whose genial presence among them was greatly appreciated. It was, the Archbishop said, a matter for great regret that the Headmaster was unable to be present, owing to an unexpected and somewhat serious breakdown in health. It had, however, been arranged that Mr Purves should take a much-needed rest for six months, when there was every hope of his being able to resume duty completely restored to his normal good health. He ventured to speak for all present when he said that Mr. Purves would carry with him into his enforced rest their deep sympathy and affection,

The Archbishop also made reference to the absence of Judge Backhouse, who, as an old member of the School Council, had been on the platform at many successive prize-days, but was at present obliged to be away from Sydney. It was, however, he said, a great pleasure to welcome Mr. Franklin who had lately returned from active service, and who was here on a visit from Melbourne. Sydney had done Melbourne a good turn by giving Mr Franklin as Headmaster of their Grammar School. (Laughter and applause.)

In the absence of Mr. Purves, the Archbishop then read on his behalf, the report of the school for the last years, as follows:

Your Excellency, Your Grace, Ladies and Gentlemen-

I have the honour to present to you the report of the School for the last year. It will remain in many memories that this time a year ago your Excellency drew a good onen from the fact that the School hymn, which had just been sung in Chapel, was the same one that you had heard nearly twenty

years before at Pretoria, when the South African war was drawing to a close, and you wished for the School and the whole world that a similar blessing might then be close at hand. Within two months Your Excellency's omen was fulfilled, and as a first duty we would now record our devout thankfulness for the blessing of Peace. The war has left a sad series or blanks, no fewer than 122 in the roli of Old Boys. Their names are read in Chaper on many commemorative days throughout the year that they may be familiar as household words to every member of the School, and that the tradition may be established that here in our midst belonging to our School are sacred names. The fortunes of our soldiers have had a faithful historian in my good friend, Mr. Davies, and no one knows so well as I his indefatigable services in this heavy task which has been a labour of love to him. The Chapel has become richer in memories and beauties. The silk flags in the Chancel are in memory of John Wilson and Eric Sinclair; sections of panelling bear the names of Colin McCulloch and Kenneth Taylor; a window completing the series of allied national saints commemorates Reginald Brown, and there are tablets to R. E. C. Royle, C. V. McCulloch, G. P. Edwards, and F. D. W. Oatley, whose sword is shortly to be hung alongside.

The memorial organ to be presented by Mrs. J. G. Antill Pockley is now under construction by Messieurs Norman and Beard, and we look forward before a year is over to hearing the services made beautiful by this noble monument to a gallant Old Boy. Another gift of great importance to the School is a rowing shed, given by Mr. and Mrs. Russell Sinclair in memory of a previous Captain of Boats, who rowed for three successive years in a winning eight, and who was as simple-minded a boy as the School has ever been happy enough to own, such a boy as leaves everyone the better for his friendship. The shed is now being built in Looking Glass Bay and will be of the greatest value to School crews. The School is indebted

Mr. F. W. Hixson, and his willing victims for the sum of about £600 to buy the land and equip the shed. Now that we are to have a shed of our own on the Parramatta, perhaps there will not be so many Saturday excursions up the Lane Cove River, where our friends at St. Ignatius College have for many years, allowed us to use their staging, swimming baths, and grounds as if they were our own, a privilege which has been greatly appreciated, and has' made all the difference to the comfort of our crews.

Memorial Playing Fields at Northbridge are the School's principal effort to commemorate its pride in the number, nearly 900, of its sons, such as the author of the School song must have had in mind when he wrote the

verse beginning—

"And here's to the fellow, who, facing the foe ..

These grounds will be opened on the 27th of this month by one of our oldest friends, Sir Thomas Dibbs, three of whose grandsons, Old Boys of the School, fought for the Empire, two of them at the price of their lives; the third with an unrivalled record as an all round athlete who also won the. highest distinction at the University is R. J. A. Massie, Major, Croix de Guerre, and D.S.O. with two mentions in despatches to his credit. You are all invited to attend the opening of the grounds and to see the use to which your generous contributions have been Much still remains to be done, and as a work so well begun must not unfinished the indefatigable dand who arranged last year's fete and this year's dance in the Town Hall, and secured for us a bright performance by the Merry Makers, have further designs in mind. A School like this is always needing money for something, and we can only ask the many cheerful givers to believe that we are grateful, and to look for a reward in the character of the boys, in whose hands later on some part of their country's destiny will lie. Sir Samuei McCaughey's princely be-

quest of £10,000 will do much to relieve financial difficulties; we greatly appreciate Sir Samuel's catholicity of led him to remember interests that schools belonging to other churches than his own; he might have perhaps heard, as is nothing but the truth, that there have come to this School from his own large and powerful and generous communion, many of our most distinguished boys, whom we should have missed sorely in scholarship, sport and character. It is hoped that this bequest will make possible the execution of a scheme for additional buildings, which would have undertaken earlier, but for the fosses caused by the epidemic, in it will be included the James Blackwood Memorial Laboratory which has inevitably been delayed until it should possible to carry out the scheme of which it is a part.

During this year of sickness we have mourned the deaths of two boys-Alick Drummond-both Hardy and Gavin leaving behind them unsulfied names. and of Dr. Basil St. Vincent Welch, a returned soldier, with a splendid war record, and of Mr. Wilfrid Docker, the School's honoured friend and bursar, who was a regular attendant at open services and on Speech Days.

The School was fleavily handicapped in cricket by the absence, either through influenza or the apprehension of it, of several prominent members, but I am pleased to remember that the Second XI have won all their competition matches up to date, and are in consequence leading for the premiership. With the new grounds all our teams should have much better chances. I know that with one small ground at the School and the irregular use of the St. Leonards' oval it has been a hard task to provide sufficient games for 500 boys, and that harassed masters of sport are to be admired for the ingenuity with which they have partially met the difficulty. We now look forward to a time not distant when we shall be able to play seven matches simultaneously, and still have room for tennis courts and practice wick-A recorder of School rowing might almost borrow the words of a ker-

tain James Stuart, who is said to have commenced his recruiting speeches for a desperate adventure with the ominous phrase, "Accustomed as I am to mis-fortune." Last year's intended stroke had an appendicitis operation which put him out of the boat three days before the race, and this year's seven broke his slide at the start. We hope that mistortune does not intend to travel steadily up the boat till she reaches the bow seat. What is most to be regretted is that for two years in succession Mr. Alan Ramsay, creator of oarsmanship and character, has been robbed by ill-luck of the true results of his

patient and skilful work.

In examinations, however, we have been more fortunate, 24 boys obtained Leaving Certificates, and out of the four University Scholarships open to the whose State, Welsh and Melville won respectively the general proficiency general proficiency and the mathematical, and Welsh was also proxime to Melville for the latter scholarship. It was gratifying to no-tice the large number of first classes in mathematics, physics, and English and Welsh's position at the head of the first class in the first and second of these subjects. In the Intermediate Examination 58 boys passed, two of them with first classes in all their subjects, . and two more with first classes in all but one. The net results of the whole 58 showed the satisfactory average of two first classes for each boy.

Towards the end of the year the Victoria League Council in England organised an Overseas Competition which was won by Kenneth Slessor with a poem

on the capture of Jerusalem.

We note with pleasure the following pertormances of Old Boys: The Peach Brothers and Dr. Eric Pockley have won tennis championships; O. D. Meares the country golf championship; Chenhall, Morgan and Wilson (all formerly under Mr Ramsay, and Keith Williams. Major and M.C.), rowed in the University Eight; Ormiston, Pountney, and Sut-tor were in the representative A.I.F. nootball XV, and Mayne in the opposing New South Wales and Australian.

team; Gregory and Trenerry had places in the A.I.F. cricket eleven at home; E. f. King-Salter has continued at the R.M.C., Sandhurst, the soundness of body and mind which marked him at School, and has not only been first of ali cadets in the second year examination, but won the heavyweight boxing of the College, and being chosen to represent Sandhurst against Woolwich, won the match for his side. L. H. Holden, M.C. after flying from Mel-bourne to Sydney, is now flying from one country centre to another as a pro-moter of the Peace Loan; and Sidney Pickles, the world-famed airman is now back again with a three seater Avro and proposes to give scientific exhibitions of the safety of his art, and to place aviation on a sound commercial basis. We hope there will be included in his scheme a cheap and regular service between the School and the Memorial Playing Fields.

The School offers to its returning soldiers a proud welcome and values their services and those of their fallen comrades more than any other distinction that can come its way. We hope to see them in very large numbers at the Old Boys Evening on the 27th of this month. Ot returning masters, we already have back Major Harris, and Captain-Chaplain Browne and are expecting shortly ; Captain Dixon, Sergeant Barton and Sergeant Ross, all of them old and valued members of the staff.

I am charged with a message to the School and its friends from Mr. and Mrs. Hodges, who greatly regret that neither of them can be present, but send good wishes and kindly remem-

brances to you all.

Many of us in responsible positions have felt that the strain of long war years succeeded by an epidemic year would have been insupportable but for the help of our friends; and I, personally am bankrupt of words in which to express my gratitude for the generous sympathy of the Council and the lovalty and energy of my colleagues, upon whom more than upon anyone else, depends the success of the School.

His Excellency congratulated the upon their fine year's record, boys which, judging from the point of view of examinations, seemed better than that of any previous year. It was, he said, extraordinary that the School should capture two out of the four matriculation scholarships. He was glad to learn also of the increased facilities for sport which the boys would shortly have. Referring to the boat race on the Parramatta, of which His Excellency been a spectator, he condoled with them in the bad luck which had befallen their crew when No. seven had broken his slide during the contest. He hoped that the next rowing season would amends, and that the School would carry off the championship of the river. In sport, as in studies, a healthy spirit of rivalry between schools was a great incentive to effort.

But highly as they prized the success won in the schoolroom or the sports ground, he felt sure that what they would value most would be the fact that as many as 900 had gone from the School to do their duty on the stricken fields of battle—a number exceedingly high in proportion to the School. Of this number 122 had fallen. We used, said His Excellency, to pray like Solomon for a long life; but it is better to pray for an honorable one, even if it be short.

Referring to the fine memorials which had already been erected in the School Chapel, His Excellency told the boys that these should act as a tonic, ever reminding them of the high tradition the school had established, and urging them to carry on those traditions to the fullest extent in their power. Austra-

lia, he said, has a unique chance to develop its civilisation unhampered by many old customs pertaining to the oldworld, yet heir to a great history and to the grandest national traditions. It was possible for Australia to set an example to the whole world by establishing happier conditions for her people than could be found elsewhere. This an ideal for the boys to remember when, later, they went out to play their part in the outside world. His Excellency was heartily applauded when he urged the boys, and all present, to set their faces against anything which might make for cleavage among the various portions of our united Empire.

Canon Sharp, senior member of the Council, moved a vote of thanks to the Governor. Canon Sharp's connection with the School covers a period of some 35 years, so that its history was bound up with his life's work and interest. He referred to the presence on the platform of Mr. T. de V. Lamb, Private Secretary to His Excellency, who was one of the Old Boys of the School.

Mr. Robinson, in seconding the vote of thanks to His Excellency for his genial presence and words of encouragement to the boys, especially welcomed Lady Davidson, who was present at their prize-giving for the first time.

Afternoon tea was served on the lawn as usual after the formal business was concluded.

#### Rowing.

HIS term work has been steadily going on at the shed, and new material being licked into shape with fairly satisfactory results. On account of the bad weather conditions which usually prevail during September and October it is advisable to do as much of the early work as possible during the winter term, when there is nearly always good water for the "freshers," to learn to handle the oar, and to become accustomed to the boat. Their watermanship comes with the later experiences of wind and bad water, which are all too frequent during the early summer months.

With the advent of the House scheme for sports, we shall at last see the commencement of a race of best crews in the School for Head of the River, which will do much to bring the sport up to a high pitch of excellence, as it will give mediocre and backward oarsmen a chance of rowing in the same boat

with the more experienced ones. It will also provide a much better chance for the "freshers" to obtain excellent racing practice in the shape of a race for second · House crews. The difficulty will be to obtain coaching for the various Houses, but with assistance from Old Boys we should be able to get over . It is very probable that the first championship races will be rowed at the end of the next term, but details as tocourse and locality have yet to be decided. Of the new material presented, this wear Beer ii, Roberts, Sinclair ii, J. Windeyer, Hadley, Boundy and Beer i, are shaping very well indeed, and. the remainder with a few exceptions are decidedly above the average of last year's material. Next term, after the Combined Schools' Sports, we hope tobe able to start preparations for next. year's race, the first step being the preparations for our annual Christmas races.

Our life in the Regiment has been one long joy, and so

strong is the honour and discipline that we have gained the reputation wherever we have been as the best regiment on the front. Our children have got something to look back upon, and we who still remain have got something to up-To-day all fiold and live for. faces we knew and loved best have gone, and there remain about two of us who really belong to the Regiment and a few men, and soon too we will be dispersed to goodness knows where —it is very sad.

The new battalion is being formed at home and the head quarters will take over, but no officer who has not been on active service since 1914 or is allowed out of Egypt unless special demob. I am going to Cairo to-morrow on leave for a few days.

F. P. McIntyre writes from the Headquarters of the North Persian Force, Kasvin, on the 19th June. 1919, and states that in about six weeks time his address would be the Cavalry Club, Picadilly, London. His brother Donald had settled down in the farming ing business in the States, and appeared to be doing pretty well after his very serious ill health in England from the result of shell shock. The youngest brother had been a prisoner in Germany for nearly two and a half years. Since the armistice he had been engaged in relief operations in Holland and Germany, and had just returned to Eng-

land, only to find that his battalion (2nd Argyle and Sutherland Highlanders) was due for foreign service. He was shot down over Lille, at the battle or the Somme, and had now definitely decided to throw over the air-service. "We are still in occupation here, and as such are part of the army of Occupation of the Mesopotamia Expeditionary Force, though distant from it by about 600 miles by road! So far nothing of a tangible nature has been decided as regards our fate at the Peace Conference; in fact Persia's demands and needs have not even been mentioned as far as I know. One thing, though, is quite palpably obvious that without us she cannot stand alone with the unrest that exists in Afghanistan, and all round her northern frontiers, as far as Urmigh, in Armenia. I should say we shall be here in one form or another tor many years. The country can never really develop until we take it over from an administrative point view and Egyptise it. Bribery corruption are rife and where these two exist "development "is a "finite impossi-With a good administration and a progressive policy of railroads, country has vast possibilities. At the present it is stagnant, and only kept going by British capital spent here in lavish quantities.
