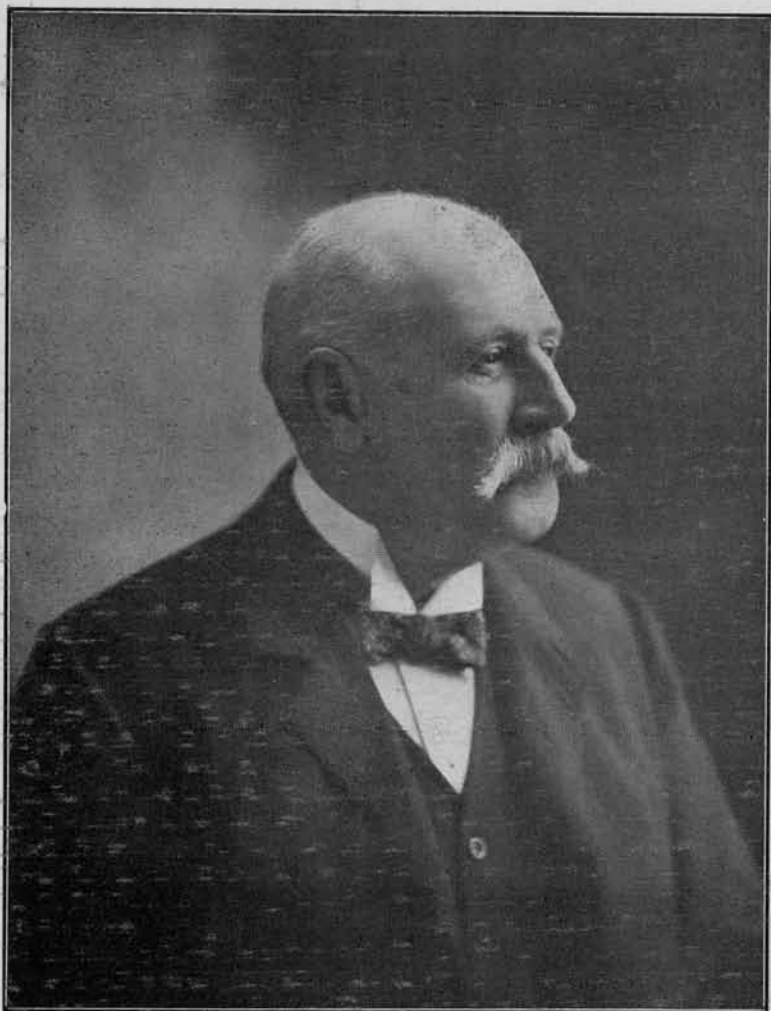

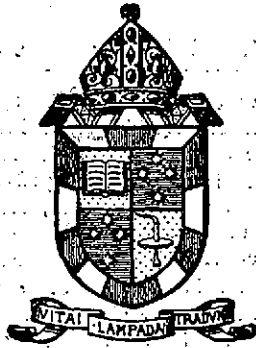
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Mr. A. F. ROBINSON.

The Debating Society.

TOWARDS the beginning of this term the Debating Society was revived with renewed enthusiasm, engendered to a considerable extent, no doubt, by the prospect of competing for a shield with the debating societies of the other Great Public Schools. For the purpose of the debating competition, the Schools have been divided into two groups. Our School forms a group with St. Ignatius and St. Joseph's, and, during the next term an inter-schools' debate will be held with each of these competitors for oratorical honours. The final debate in the competition will take place after the Leaving Certificate examinations.

So far our own Society has held five meetings. There have been four debates, of which two were between Houses. The School House has entered the lists, once against Hodges House in opposition to the proposal that Sydney be the Federal capital, and a second time against Robson House in opposition to the proposal that the State Parliament be abolished. The first House debate was won by the School House on the casting vote of the chairman, while Mr Barton very kindly assisted by judging the debate on points, and by criticising the speakers. The second House Debate was won by Robson House. One meeting of the Society was, with very successful results, devoted to speech making. We had speeches followed by interesting

discussions on such subjects as perpetual motion and telepathy.

For next term we hope to draw up a programme of subjects to be debated. Any suggestions of suitable subjects will be thankfully received. It may be pointed out that many useful books on a great variety of subjects have been added to the library, and that Mr. Barton will be willing to direct boys in their choice of books for "reading up" any particular subject to be discussed in the debating society.

At present we have quite a large number of promising speakers, among whom may be mentioned Louat, Goldsmid, McIntosh, Gilfillan, Blackwood, Bellingham, Pannifex, Ellerton, Stevens, Coates, Black and others; nor must we forget to give praise to some of the younger boys, who, by short speeches, have "broken the ice," and taken the first steps towards greater things in the future. It also speaks well for the general interest in debating that boys whose spare time is almost wholly occupied with sport have endeavoured to show some interest in our society. We hope that in the future a large number of boys will avail themselves of the opportunity to practise public speaking which is offered them by the Debating Society. Before the end of this term a programme of inter-debating fixtures and also a book of by-laws will be issued by the G.P.S. Debating Committee.

The Eric Sinclair Memorial Shed.

THE germ of the Sinclair Memorial shed came into existence during the early stages of the preparation of the 1919 crews. We were at that time rowing to Riverview or to Gladesville on Saturdays, accompanied by Mr. F. W. Hinson, who placed his launch at our disposal for coaching; we stowed our boats where we could, cooked our lunch, and had nowhere in particular to rest until it was time for the row back. In commiserating on our "hardships," Mr Hixson remarked that it was a pity we had no shed of our own in a sheltered locality, where we could camp in comfort, and the discussion turned on possible sites. Mr Ramsay followed this up by enquiries as to water frontage on Looking Glass Bay, and found the present site open to purchase. This was secured, and Mr Hixson, with his usual energy, looked into the matter of ways and means to construct a suitable building. On hearing of the scheme, Mr. Russell Sinclair immediately offered the shed as a memorial to his son, Eric Russell

Sinclair, who rowed in the (6) seat in the winning crews of 1913-14-15. Plans were made, and the building commenced in August, 1919, and handed over to the School on December 2nd, 1919, the House Regatta being held on that date.

The shed measures 70 feet by 25 feet, is double decked, the lower part being used to store boats, oars, etc. The upper floor, with balcony attached, is used as a dormitory, fitted with 25 iron beds, having mattresses, blankets, and pillows all complete. At the rear of the dormitory is a large space used as a storeroom, and beneath this on the ground floor is a roomy bath room.

Adjoining the main shed on the northern side is a kitchen 12ft. by 14ft., containing two gas stoves, cupboard, shelves, tables, and sink. It is proposed at a future date to add a dining and a reading room, with verandah alongside the main shed. The accompanying photo gives an idea of the shed and surroundings as seen from the bay.

Rowing.

WE assembled for the Christmas camp this year on Feb. 2, at the Memorial Shed, Gladesville, and remained there until the 10th February, the weather being good the whole time. From our experience of the shed, we have concluded that it is impossible to overestimate the benefits which have been conferred on the School rowing

by this magnificent memorial. Arrangements were made with Mrs. G. Towns to cook for us, which she did excellently. There was also of course the immense saving of time through not having to row to Abbotsford and back for our meals. Beer and Roberts brought canoes with them, and much diversion was obtained through these,

the "salts" always arriving back at the pontoon drenched through.

The eight had already been seated for some time, but the fours were not really settled upon until some weeks after the termination of the camp, the final seating being: First four—Boundy, Braddock, R., Sinclair i, Johnson ii. Second Four:—Litchfield iii, Roberts, Beer ii, Osborne. Third Four: Windeyer i, Windeyer ii, Mander-Jones i, Beer i.

After camp, the rowing was carried on from the Berry's Bay shed, with the usual Saturday row to Gladesville for lunch, the row back being generally a fierce fight against a North East wind. However, the eight gradually shook down into a powerful crew, moving their boat well at all times, and had only one rocky period, about a week before the race, when the speeding up of handwork and recovery engendered a certain amount of unsteadiness. This, however, was ironed out during the week preceding the race, and on the 17th April the crew rowed as fine a race as could be wished for from any crew. However, they were not destined to obtain the fruits of their labours, as a foul occurred about 400 yards from the finish, putting our crew into a position from which they could not extricate themselves. The re-row on Monday, April 19th, showed a stale crew, and they ran into third place to T.K.S. and S.G.S.

The work of the first four was characterised by a very powerful swinging catch and drive, finished on the legs, which made them a fast crew in spite of blemishes in hand work on the part

of (2) and slidework on the part of (3). Bow and stroke rowed well on all occasions, but each individual should pay careful attention to the notes at the end of this article. They rowed a good race, well up to practice form, in fact, above it, and had a hard fight with T.K.S. for second place, being eventually bested by a quarter of a length, S.I.C. winning the event, their cox making the best possible use of the tide.

The second four developed a very bright catch, shoved hard through with the legs, with a bright recovery, and steady swing, and promised all over to win their event. The swing is now steady and well balanced, the beginning sharp and hard, the leg work good, the finish long and hard, the hand work smart and the recovery becoming freer and smoother each row, consequently the boat is running well between strokes, a very good indication of pace.

Apart from his activities in other directions, Mr Hixson lent invaluable assistance, for which it is quite impossible to thank him adequately, by placing his launch at the disposal of the coaches, particularly for the whole period of training. Without this aid

the crew could not have been brought to the high standard it has attained.

F. P. Boundy (bow).—Requires to brace the body a shade more at the catch, and keep the shoulders up during the swing back. Smart hands at all times. Otherwise good oar.

(2) D. K. Braddock—Requires to drop and shoot the hands away much more smartly, following with the body swing down to the catch; allow body to swing well out between the knees; feel the stretcher with the feet the last part of the swing towards the catch.

(3) R. R. Sinclair should try to allow the slide to come away from back chocks with hands, and travel freely as body swings forward, until just before the catch. A shade more body brace over catch will strengthen finishing position; otherwise good oar.

(4) R. M. Johnson. Distinctly good. Should try to keep shoulders steady at catch, and carry them smartly back to take the water. Stroked his crew very well during the race.

S. Griffith (cox) was of invaluable assistance to the crew, both in training and in the race. A very good coxswain.

In conclusion, we offer T.K.S. our heartiest congratulations on winning the Major Rennie Trophy, and on the performance of their four.

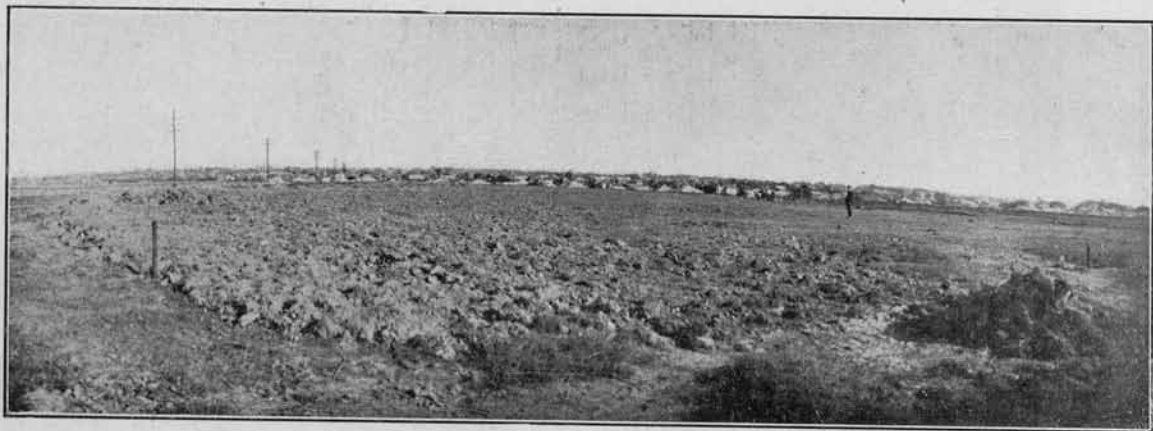

The Memorial Playing Fields.

THE first and main oval is now finished. During last vacation and the early part of this term the whole of the oval has been top-dressed, the picket fence has been erected, and the scoring board finished.

A sub-soiler has been bought and the ground for the trees along the outside fence prepared and the trees are now being planted under the supervision of experts.

The committee has decided to prepare tennis courts at once, near the pavilion on the western side, and to carry on the preparation of the second oval as soon as we can gain possession of the grounds, which will be in August.

The Grounds Committee have joined with the Memorial Rowing Shed Committee, for the purpose of holding joint dances, fetes, etc., and thus preventing opposing functions being held. Two-thirds of the proceeds are to go to the Ground Fund, and one-third to the Rowing Shed Fund, in order to provide a dining-room for the crews. All private subscriptions will go, as before, direct to the Ground Fund.

The cost of levelling and preparing the second oval and of making tennis

courts will be heavy, but both are absolutely necessary, owing to the increased number of boys in the School, and the impossibility of obtaining public grounds.

Dr. Antill Pockley has offered a drinking fountain in memory of Capt. B. C. A. Pockley and Lieut. J. G. A. Pockley, to be erected on the south eastern end of the pavilion. Plans for this have been prepared and accepted, and the matter is now in the donor's hands.

The following letter has been sent to all subscribers, parents and friends of the School, and those who are in sympathy with the work.

Dear Sir,

It is the intention of the ground committee to continue with the development of the remaining area at Northbridge. We hope, this year, to complete the second oval and erect tennis courts. In order to do this further funds are necessary, and the assistance of all Old Boys, parents and friends of the School is earnestly sought. The main oval has been in constant use since September of last year; it has been topped dressed and the picket fence and scoring board have been completed; but owing to the increasing numbers in the School further grounds are absolutely necessary to provide adequate sports for all boys. It is hoped to prepare the whole of the remaining portion of the ground and thus provide at once suitable and worthy playing fields.

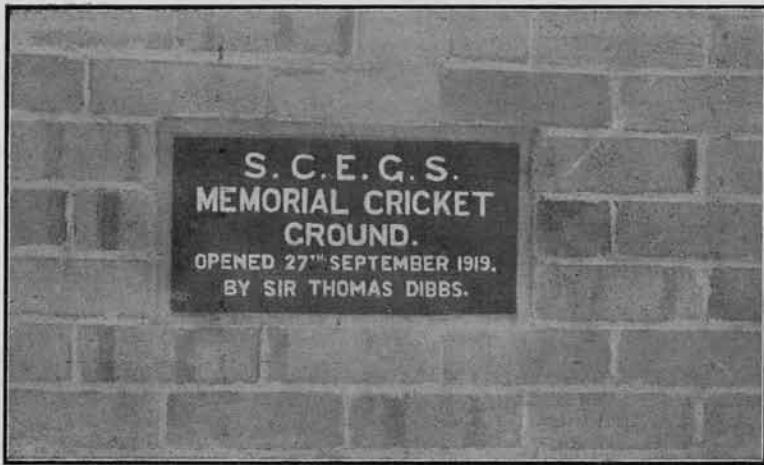

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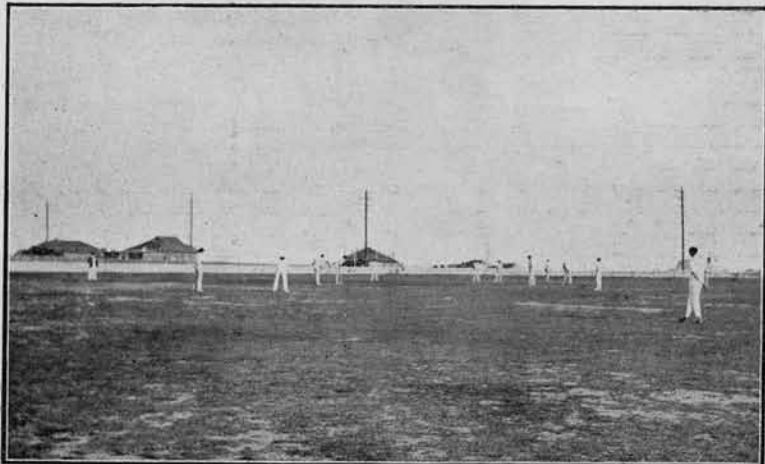

Cadet Corps.

THE early part of the term was chiefly occupied in organising companies and training candidates for commissions and non-commissioned rank. About three weeks before Easter, Headquarters requested the School to furnish a guard of honour to receive General Birdwood at Government House on his arrival in Sydney. Owing to the short notice, the lack of uniforms, and the fact that the guard was required for Easter Saturday, considerable difficulties were encountered. These, however, were surmounted by the remarkable keenness of the cadets who volunteered, and the skilful instruction of the Sergeant-Major; and with the addition of no more extra drill than a few quarter hours after morning school a good guard was turned out. On Tuesday, March 30th, His Excellency the Governor General, accompanied by Lady Helen Munro Ferguson and Captain Duncan, A.D.C., paid a surprise visit to the School on his way to Graythwaite,

After watching parade fall in, he inspected the guard and made them a short address.

On Saturday, the guard fell in at Circular Quay and marched up to the Government House, where they were inspected by the Governor, who complimented them upon their smart turn out and drill. On General Birdwood's arrival he was received with the general salute, and he inspected the guard in detail, stopping to speak to an occasional boy in the ranks and displaying considerable interest in them, both collectively and individually. After the General's departure the officer commanding the guard was complimented by Lieut. Col. James, who was in charge of all the military part of the reception, upon the fine bearing of the cadets and their excellent drill. The guard then marched off headed by the 1st Light Horse Band, and was dismissed in Macquarie Street.

Cricket.

THE term has not been a very successful one owing to the team's slow return to form. The first half of the season had been extremely promising, but the vacation was too long, and the competition matches too close to the opening of term to get back the previous term's form.

Both Boazman and Harris failed as batsmen, although Boazman improved considerably as a bowler.

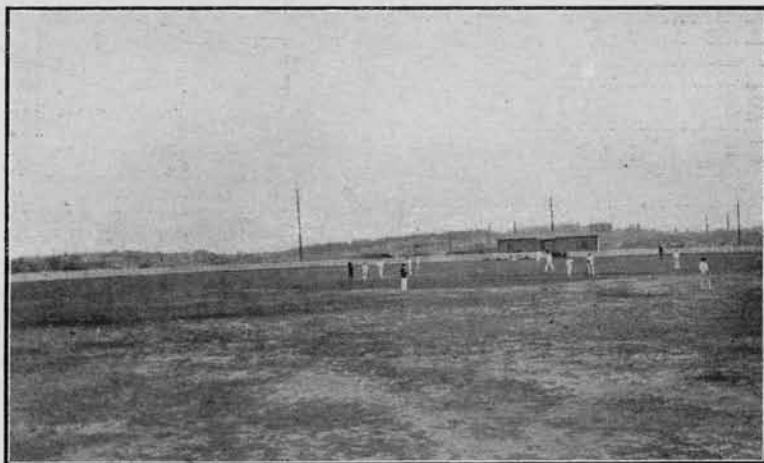

SECOND ELEVEN.
