Confirmation will be given by the Archbishop in the Chapel on Thursday, November 3rd.

The School received on April 27th from the Australian War Museum as a war trophy, No. 331 75 mm. gun (long), originally a field gun and converted to anti-aircraft, captured by the First Australian Light Horse Regiment during the operations at Amman in Palestine on September 25, 1918. The gun will be placed in a suitable position close to the main entrance gates.

In the list of Old Boys at the University, published in our last issue, the name of Mr. Eric Smith was omitted.

The net proceeds (£10) from last year's sales of "Blue and White" have been handed by the editors, Bellingham and Gilfillan, to the honorary treasurer of the Memorial Playing Fields Fund.

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Noel McIntosh has presented a handsome Cup for the House Football Competitions. This gift is greatly appreciated and brings the number of House Cups up to five. Cups are still wanted for athletics, swimming and boxing.

T. Iredale, B.Sc., has been nominated for the science research scholarship offered by the Royal Commissioners of the Exhibition of 1851, for the current year. This scholarship is awarded to a student of three years' standing for the prosecution of study and research in some branch of science, with a view of developing the manufactures and industries of his country.

#### MEMORIAL LABORATORIES.

The new laboratories have now been completed, and the members of the Science side of the school are able to do their work in a way which makes the memories of past years seem like an unpleasant dream. Two fully equipped laboratories, one for chemistry and one for physics, take the place of the old combined laboratory and classroom; each one contains six benches which will accomedate six boys at each with room to spare. The benches are fitted with lockers and drawers, and four gas taps are on the top of each. In the chemistry laboratory the benches each have, in addition to the gas fittings, a large porcelain sink in the

centre with water-tap above. Numerous cupboards provide plenty of room for apparatus, and the large fume-chambers allay the apprehension which non-scientific members of the community always feel with regard to chemical fumes. In the physics room we are able to have a great deal of the apparatus for mechanics, etc., fitted up permanently, so that the maximum amount of work may be done in the minimum of time, and the same remarks apply to many experiments in the other branches of the subjects.

We are very proud of our new laboratories; may we never forget all that they represent.

#### THE CHAPEL.

Open Sunday was on March 13, when the address was given by the Bishop of Bathurst. During the service he dedicated tablets in memory of Alan Alexander Wilson Walker, William Douglas Wilson Walker, Frank Taylor, John Clegg Taylor, Oliver Clegg Taylor, John Butler Wood, and Throsby Morrell.

Addresses have been given this term by the acting-Chaptain, the Headmaster, Mr. J. L. Pulling, Rev. F. W. Harvey (Bush Church Aid Society), Mr. J. O. Harris (Anzac Sunday), Mr. H. H. Dixon (Anzac Day).

The Anniversary Sunday will be on May 1st. The Archbishop as usual will take the early Celebration at 8 a.m. and preach at the 10.45 a.m. service.

With regard to the East Window, which is to be a memorial to all Old

Boys who volunteered for the war, the acting-Chaplain has written to Mr. M. J. Dawson, an Old Boy, who is in touch with the leading artists in England, to obtain an estimate of the probable cost.

Confirmation will be given by the Archbishop on November 3rd Classes will start early next term.

On Anzac Day there was a crowded chapel at 9.30 a.m. The service consisted of a celebration of the Holy Communion, the celebrant being the Rev. R. E. Freeth, assisted by the acting-chaplain. There were 97 communicants. The address was given by Mr. H. H. Dixon. On the previous day (Anzac Sunday) the address was given by Mr. J. O. R. Harris. On both occasions there was a commemoration of the fallen, especially of our 127 Old Boys, who had given their lives for their King and country.

#### MEMORIAL GROUNDS.

April 1st, 1921.

At the last Annual General Meeting it was decided to proceed with the preparation of further playing fields at Northbridge. Since then the work has advanced considerably, and the levelling of two more cricket or three football grounds is now well on the way to completion. When


these grounds are finished, which will be before the end of this year, the Memorial Grounds will include the Main Oval, two full-sized grounds and three tennis courts. The tennis courts are completed and so will be no further expense to the Grounds' Committee. The tender accepted for the levelling of the re-

mainder of the ground was £1640, including the cost of fencing. Besides levelling, the ground has to be grassed and water must be laid on. The work is, in consequence, a very costly one, but the Committee has every confidence in the numerous supporters of the School and its playing fields and feel certain that they will respond to this appeal for funds to enable each generation whose lot brings them under the care of the School to obtain the best that can be gained from a Great Public

School training, to develop to true manhood and become good citizens. It is in their sport that the boys learn the meaning of fellowship.

"To set the cause above renown, To love the game beyond the prize."

Every boy is expected to take an active part in sport and the School in turn does its best to give each boy a fair number of games. To carry this out properly at least five grounds are needed. Two of these we already possess, the School

#### THE DRAMATIC ENTERTAINMENT.

A comedy entitled 'The New Boy' was produced at the Coliseum Theatre on Friday evening, Dec. 3rd—the week before breaking up, too late for the last issue of "Torchbearer." "The New Boy" was probably familiar to many of the older members of the audience, having been performed by the Dramatic Society about ten or twelve years ago. With its school setting and pedagogie atmosphere it is bound to make its appeal to school boys, which it undoubtedy did on this occasion. The interest of the play attaches to the adventure of a

newly-married man, who by an extraordinary chain of circumstances finds himself enrolled as a boarder in the Birchgrove School. The indignities to which the new boy is subjected proved irresistibly funny when applied to a married man whose wife is on the premises. The part of Felix Roach, who schemed to become the heir of old Dr. Candy, was admirable played by Mr. Pulling, who by the way took the same part in the previous production. Pulling did not go through his part by merely reciting the words of the author; it may be said that he creat-

ed the part. He evolved a character which combined with the address and cunning of a Macchiavelli, the unction of a Chadband and the cleverness of a chevalier d'industrie. Miss Pulling, the daughter of Felix, and a counterfoil to her scheming father, played her part of "ingenue" in her usual dainty and piquant manner. George Blackwood as Mrs. Rennick, 'the widow with a husband,' and mother of the new boy played the part to perfection, with none of the coarseness of the masquerader, but, on the contrary, with all the feminine graces and "nuances" of speech and gesture-a distinctly clever impersonation. Firth Fraser, in the double character of husband and new boy, proved himself equal to the task, and romped through his part with a realism which showed that he had not forgotten his own schooldays. Mr. Barton, as Dr. Candy, the headmaster, acted his part with dignity and restraint. The role of the irate and implacable bucolic who disturbed the calm serenity of the headmas-

ter's study, was picturesquely pourtrayed by Jock McKenzie. Mr. H. Walters, in the soubrette part of Susan the maid, achieved an excellent first appearance, and acted with a confidence that gave promise for the future. As Bullock Major, Noel Macintosh gave an admirable display of that truculence and callousness which is often associated with initiation of the new boy. R. A. Gilfillan, as the French Master, gave an effective representation of the stage Frenchman, while R. C. Shields, as guardian of peace, filled the part admirably.

An orchestra, organised by Mr. Walmsley, including several Old Boys (to whom our thanks are due for giving up so much of their time to practices) played several pieces which were much appreciated, and added considerably to the success of the entertainment.

The net proceeds, amounting to £50, were appropriated for the benefit of the School Sports Club, which was in need of funds at the time.

#### LIBRARY NOTES.

A considerable amount of work has been done in the Library during the term. All books have been catalogued, and some re-classified. The bookshelves which were fixed, too, have been made adjustable, a change which has conduced to better classification of books.

These and other changes have proved somewhat costly. As a con-

sequence, the new books bought during the term are very few.

#### CRICKET.

#### Ist Eleven

At present the School stands second in the competition after winning three matches and losing one—against Sydney Grammar School. The team was essentially a drywicket side, and strange enough, only once was the wicket a really dry one. Generally the batting was aggressive and interesting, and with the exception of the Grammar match, the team played up to form.

The competition opened with the score of 550 runs against St. Ignatius' College—the largest total compiled by the School for many years. Boazman's innings of 212 was a very fine one, full of sparkle, and showed a batsman of the greatest promise; he has been unfortunate in not having another innings on a good wicket. Salmon has settled down into a very sound batsman, and has strengthened his on-side play.

The bowling has been good. Barr has improved considerably as a slow bowler, and has kept his length and gained control over his "bosie." Harris also bowled well, keeping a very accurate length, especially in the High School match.

Many of the team are very young, which gives good hope for the future. The fielding has been good, especially Rawling's work in the outfield. McIntosh has improved considerably behind the wickets,

He is a left-hander of much promise, but takes risks on the on side before he is set. Grieve (29) and Rawling (26) both batted well. Grieve is the steadier of the two batsmen, but is still rather cramped; Rawling gives promise of a very forcing player, but is still too anxious to score.

The innings closed for 550 runs.

A. C. Wood, after leaving school, went to England and joined Culham Theological College, with the intention of taking Holy Orders. On the outbreak of the war he joined the New Zealand Infantry and got his Commission. He spent a portion of his furlough in Sydney in 1918 and then joined his regiment in New Zealand and was killed at Le Quesnoy on November of that year.

E. L. Witts left for Gallipoli with reinforcements of the 13th A.L.H. and remained there till the evacuation. Returning to Egypt he joined the 5th (artillery) and went with them to France and remained with them till about six months before the Armistice. He then joined "A" Battery and was sent to England to qualify for a commission. He returned to Australia as a Lieutenant in January, 1920. At the time of his death he was in the Bank Rockhampton. On his return he entered the Sydney University Medical School, from whence he graduated in medicine.
