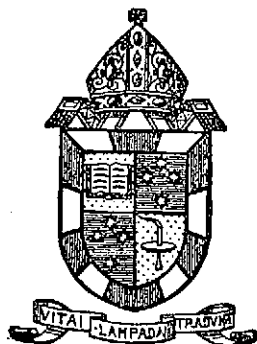

MR. A. D. HALL.

It is with deep regret that we record the death of Mr. A. D. Hall, for many years a master at the School. Mr. Hall had not been in good health for a considerable time, but with characteristic devotion to duty, he stuck to his work until he was compelled to enter a private hospital, where a fortnight afterwards he succumbed to an operation, which his condition necessitated. An appreciation by Mr. Pulling of Mr. Hall's worth as a man and a schoolmaster will be found below. In his address the speaker gave expression to the esteem in which Mr. Hall was held by his colleagues, by the boys, past and present, and by his numerous friends outside the School.

Mr. Hall's death occurred on Sunday, May 4 (the School anniversary). On Monday evening the coffin was placed in the chapel chancel, where it remained till the following day. A service was held in the Chapel at two o'clock on Tuesday, at which the Rev. D. Davies officiated. Among those present were: Messrs. C. A. Buchanan and J. Carrington Pope (G.P.S., A. A.), R. H. Bode, C. J. D. Goldie (Sydney Grammar School), two Brothers from St. Joseph's College, Cortis Jones (Newington), S. J. Boydell (The King's School), the Hon. R. J. Black, Messrs. A. B. S. White, R. W. Carey, F. W. Hixson, Professor Holme, Rev. Canon Charlton,

Rev. H. N. Baker, H. U. Jaques, M.L.A., W. A. Purves, members of Council, Ven. Archdeacon D'Arcy Irvine, Messrs. H. H. Massie, W. C. B. Tiley, T. Busby, F. Merewether, and G. G. Black.

During the course of the service the following address was delivered by Mr. Pulling:—

We are gathered here to-day to pay a last ceremonial mark of respect to one who earned the love of all whose privilege it was to know him well, and the high esteem of all with whom he came in contact. I say the last ceremonial mark of respect, for well I know that into the hearts of those who have known Arthur Hall, his life and his work, will often come thoughts, and to their lips will often come words of affection and admiration for a great man. Such words and such thoughts are tributes more eloquent than the most solemn pomp and ceremony.

Arthur Hall lived and worked in this School that he loved for thirty-three years, a generation of mankind. During that time thousands of boys have passed through their course here and gone forth into the world. I am not employing the extravagance of panegyric when I say that there are few, if any, of those boys who have not come under his influence, and that there is not one who, conscious of that influence, does not feel that he is a better man for it. Wherever two or three of his old boys or his old colleagues are gathered together in the years to come, and the talk goes back to the old School, the name of Arthur Hall will be among the first to spring to their lips, and it will be uttered with affection and with praise.

Perhaps the traits which made the deepest impression upon us all were his single-mindedness and his earnestness. In the long years that he devoted to the service of the School it was his joy to labour in

her interests. Whether it was cricket or rowing, or running, or this or that of which he took charge, he was never satisfied until he had mastered the technique to the full extent of his capabilities, in order that he might give to the boys the very best that he could give. He neither spared his pains nor stinted his leisure for their benefit.

If he was stern, he was stern only to one who was slack or shuffling; and then ever ready to hold out a helping hand to him whom he had taught by discipline and example to help himself.

Example, that is the keynote of his excellence. No one could be associated with him, either as colleague or as pupil, without deriving inspiration from one who practised what he preached; one who never turned for one moment from the straight path of duty.

Kind of heart, simple of soul, purposeful of mind, energetic of body, he had learned more fully than any man I have ever known, not only to obey, but to love to obey the precept, "Whatever thy hand findeth to do, do it with all thy might."

I saw him for the last time nine days ago. Though frail and on a bed of sickness, he spoke with pleasure and with all his old fire of the success of the sports meeting with Newington; then he spoke of his Latin class, and said, "I hear that they are working well and coming on, so I am content." Content to suffer himself so long as his work was not suffering.

How widely his worth was known and appreciated is testified by the tributes of affection and expressions of deep regret that have been received from many sources beyond the School—from athletic associations of this State, the staffs and boys of other great Public Schools, from the G.P.S. A.A., on the council of which his wisdom has been of service for so many years.

But we are here, not only to mark our respect for him, we are also here to mourn, to find comfort, and to offer comfort.

Great, irreparable as is the loss to us

of the School, so great that we cannot in this hour of our loss, picture in our imaginations the School without him, so great that it seems as if a pillar had been torn from the edifice, yet it will be well for us to remember the courage that Arthur Hall himself would have bidden us to show in such an issue; to remind ourselves that though we shall no more see in these precincts that familiar form, nor ever again hear that well-known voice in our halls, yet that he has in the truest sense passed on the torch of life, and that the flame which he kindled during his life of devoted service will never be extinguished.

And if our loss is great, we do not forget that there are those to whom he was still nearer and dearer, who are seeking consolation to-day from the Highest Source of Comfort.

If human sympathy—and human sympathy is one means by which the God of mercy pours balm upon sore hearts—if human sympathy can pierce with a kindly ray of sunshine the dark cloud of sorrow that now envelops those mourners, the assurance that such sympathy is theirs lies in this Chapel filled with those who dearly prized the worth of Arthur Hall, and in the knowledge that there are many, many others who could not be present in body, but who are mourning with us in spirit for a great schoolmaster, a dear friend, and a good man.

As the cortège moved off, the boys of the School lined the road on both

sides from the School gates as far as Miller Street. A large number of Old Boys and friends assembled at the graveside in the Northern Suburbs Cemetery, where the burial took place, and at which Mr. Davies again officiated.

Numerous wreaths were sent to the Chapel, testifying to the esteem in which our late master was held by all those with whom he came in contact. Amongst those who sent wreaths were:—School Boat Club, School Athletic Club, Boys of S.C.E.G.S., Staff of S.C.E.G.S., Old Boys' Union, School Council, Sydney Grammar School, G.P.S.A.A.A., Robson House, Old Boys of the University, Old Boys' Club, David Maughan, S.C.G.G.S.

The Torchbearer, on behalf of the School, tenders to Mrs. Hall and family its sincere sympathy for the great loss they have sustained in the death of a husband and father. Mr. Hall has been a frequent contributor to its columns, and his articles—poetry as well as prose—were always interesting, and will be sadly missed from future issues.

THE CHAPEL.

Addresses have been given this term by the Revs. Dr. Pritchard, H. S. Begbie, C. P. Brown, Canon W. A. Charlton, the Bishop of Polynesia, the Headmaster, and the Acting-Chaplain.

On March 28 there was a service for the admission of prefects, which was taken by the Headmaster and the Acting-Chaplain.

James Misitou, who is supported in the New Guinea Mission from the

Schools' Mission Fund, writes that he, with two others, are engaged in teaching in the Eroro School, where they have 140 children, all of whom are most regular in their attendance. He was married last September, and is anxious to get a letter from someone at the school.

On Anzac Day the address was given by Sir Henry Braddon.

Confirmation classes will start early next term. Those who wish to be confirmed this year must give their names in as soon as possible to Mr. Davies.

On Palm Sunday, at Evensong, Mr. C. Q. Williams sang "Les Rameaux" (J. Faure) as an offertory solo.

The anniversary service was held on May 4. The preacher was the

Rev. F. W. Tugwell (C.F.). There was a very large congregation, which included several old boys.

On May 6 there was service in memory of Mr. A. D. Hall, who had died in hospital on the preceding Sunday after an operation. The largest number of Old Boys who had ever attended at a school service were present, both in chapel and at the grave, to show their respect for their old master. A detailed account will be found in another column. The service was taken by the Rev. D. Davies. Mr. J. L. Pulling gave the address, and the Headmaster read the lessons.

ROWING.

Christmas Camp this year commenced on January 25, and continued until February 5. Twenty-three boys attended, and from them an eight was boated, the remainder being divided into fours, rowing in the heavy boats. Considerable changes were made in all crews during the camp and succeeding it, and the weather was by no means the best that one could desire, south to south-east winds predominating. However, camp was again an enjoyable prelude to the hard work of training, and, when we got back to

Berry's Bay, we found that there were worse places than the Parramatta River in a southerly wind.

The House Regatta had furnished us with a good supply of heavy material, and the crews were subsequently seated as follows:—

A reserve four was also boated, consisting of: Plaskitt, Warden, Bell, Shorter i., and which was coached by Messrs. A. A. Heath and R. A. Gilfillan.

After the camp the eight rowed fairly continuously. For the first month of the term the work was done at Berry's Bay, and no great improvement appeared. For the last eight weeks of training, however, the crew rowed at Gladesville. This was a very great advantage, and added to the pleasure of the work. Berry's Bay is not by any means the place it used to be. The increased number of works up the river, the coal jetty at Ball's Head, the activities at Cockatoo Island, all seem to draw a continuous stream of traffic, which makes the bay more fitted for a surf boat than an eight. The fact that a couple of cars were usually available made it possible to row at Gladesville without loss of school time, and without arriving home unduly late.

From the first the eight showed promise, but it has always been difficult to get a true rhythm in the boat. The main trouble throughout has been due to a very good fault—over-eagerness. The crew is always prepared to work, and requires to be continually restrained in order to get any grip of the idea of steadiness.

For very similar reasons the blades are not gripping far enough behind the riggers, and the finish is

hurried, and not quite even. However, considering the lack of experience of the boys, the crew is a really good one, and will give a good account of itself if it shows its true form. The beginning is taken without hesitation, and the legs are well applied. During the last stages of training they did very good work indeed.

The first four made extremely slow progress, a not unforeseen occurrence in view of the size of the crew. They did not seem to be able to loosen themselves up at all, and obtain a free and smart method of rowing. Consequently, Camp on April 25 found them rowing stiffly at 18-22, with plenty of power and fairly well together. It was not until Easter Monday that the crew began to find itself, and bow and three to smarten up their work. That week the improvement in their work was a marvel to behold, length and speed being their characteristics. Their times, over set pieces of work, compared favourably with those of last year's winners of the Yaralla Cup, and at time of writing the crew show every sign of being a fast one, and on account of its weight (averaging 11st.), a hard one to beat.

The Second Four took some time to get together, and its composition was not finally determined until the middle of the term. After March 15, however, they improved rapidly. They were a lissome set of boys, and developed a smooth action which got

a great deal of pace from the boat. They rowed several courses before the race in excellent time.

The day of the heats turned out to be perfect, a very light N.E. breeze just ruffling the surface of the water. Conditions for boat-racing could not have been better.

The Second Four won their heat in convincing style from King's School, with a margin of four lengths, in 6min. 53 3-5secs. From a slow start the crew picked up a lead at Mortlake point, and gradually increased the advantage to the finish.

The second heat resulted in a win for St. Joseph's College from Sydney High School by three-quarters of a length, in 6min. 55 4-5sec.

The First Four got away to a good start, but Sydney High School rapidly took up a leading position, which they maintained over the course. The School crew had an advantage of a length at the half-mile, but at Cabarita they lost their swing, and permitted King's and St. Joseph's to close up. In a close race for the finish, St. Joseph's gained second place by half a length from King's, with the School crew a canvas behind King's. Time, 6min. 50secs.

The second heat resulted in a win for Scots College by one and a quarter lengths from St. Ignatius in 6min. 59 3-5secs.

During the Camp the Headmaster arranged for a short film of moving

pictures to be taken of the Eight. This was shown privately for coaching purposes on April 15. We are much indebted to Mr. T. C. Jones for his help in the preparation and projection of the film.

During the training of the crew a number of Old Boys have visited the shed, and on two occasions a crew has been boated, giving the eight something to pace them over a small (!) portion of their course. This sort of thing is very much appreciated, and it would be an enormous help if Old Boys could arrange for a crew to turn out each Saturday during training camp. We were very glad to receive visits from Major R. S. Reid, Mr. W. A. Purves, N. Vogan, H. F. Wilson, C. W. Pulver, and several members of last year's eight. All Old Boys are heartily welcomed to the shed, even if we cannot give them all a trip in the launch. We are much obliged to Mr. Hixson and F. D. Hixson for the use of their launch on several occasions, and also to Russell Roberts.

The first heat of the Eights resulted in a win for St. Joseph's College by half a length from St. Ignatius' College in 9min. 33secs.

The second heat resulted in a win for the School crew from Sydney Grammar School by one length, in 9min. 33 3-5secs. Getting away to a good start, the crew showed good pace, and by the time Putney was reached were showing a lead of one and a half lengths, which opened out

to nearly two lengths by the time Cabarita was passed. Sydney Grammar made a determined effort to row home, but the School held them off, and won with a length advantage.

Better conditions for rowing could hardly be imagined than those of Saturday, May 3. There was a light breeze from S.S.E., not enough to disturb the water, and the scene as the various steamers and launches took up their positions at or near the finish beggared description.

The first race, for the Yaralla Cup, was won easily by Sydney High School in 6min. 33½secs. They showed remarkably good combination, and established a lead early in the race, crossing to the southern shore to escape the tide, and gradually drew away from the field. We offer Sydney High School our congratulations on their success in this their first venture into the schools' rowing world.

The race for Second Fours provided a highly spectacular finish. The School crew started scratchily, but off Mortlake had established a short lead, which they maintained until reaching Cabarita. Here the heavy St. Joseph's crew, who had been striking a lower rate, put in their challenge, and the two crews drew away from the field, St. Joseph's gradually gaining to three-quarter length at Gladesville wharf. Cowlshaw timed his sprint better than the St. Joseph's stroke, and, the

crew responding gamely, caught and passed St. Joseph's with a half-length to spare in 6min. 50secs.

The race for the championship provided a magnificent race, and we offer Sydney Grammar School our congratulations on completing the "hat trick." We boated the lightest of the crews for the final, while S.G.S. boated the heaviest. The crews got away fairly well together, with St. Joseph's showing a slight advantage round Putney Point. As the race proceeded St. Joseph's dropped back, with St. Ignatius still further in the rear, and the two Grammar School crews began to fight the battle out, the School crew having an advantage of about half a length at Tennyson, and rowing a lower rate. At Cabarita Caswell commenced to pick his crew up, and they responded well to a gradual quicken. The School answered with a slight rise in the rate, and the crews raced on level terms to Gladesville, but the superior weight of S.G.S. told, and they drew ahead inch by inch, to win by three-quarters of a length in 9min. 43secs. The School crew showed very fine form, which stuck to them to the finish, and they put up a great struggle against tide and weight all over the course. Litchfield handled his crew very well, and steered good courses in both heats and finals.

Though we did not win, the result of the race leaves a feeling which is not entirely disappointment. The

crew could not have done better on the day. It was a splendid performance against a head wind and a strong tide. There is no doubt that the crew was one of the fastest we have had, and one of the most determined. Once more, congratulations to "Grammar."

The annual football match against
the School was played at North-
bridge on Friday, May 2. The Old
Boys were represented by: L. G.
Bennett, D. K. Braddock, J. C.
Brooks, C. B. B. Byrne, W. N. Cad-
wallader, O. C. Crossman, M. Greive,
R. G. O. Harris, G. Manchee, R. A.
McWilliam, G. Phillips, V. H. Treatt,
J. H. Todhunter, A. Uther, and B.
W. Windeyer. The Old Boys were
much heavier than the School XV.,
and as most of them played grade
football they were in good training.
The result ended in their favour by
18 to 5.

The annual dinner took place in Sargent's restaurant, Market Street, on May 2. It was extremely disappointing to have such a poor attendance. Over one hundred and twenty signified their intention to be present, and as only sixty-five were present the dinner will prove a great financial loss to the Union. The toasts were: "The King," proposed by the Headmaster (President); "The School and Union," proposed by H. V. Jaques, M.L.A., and responded to by the President, who gave a detailed account of the School activities during the year, and also what was being done by the Headmasters' Association to promote the usefulness of the schools. He emphasised the great regret of the whole School and Union at the illness of the Archbishop, and their hope of his speedy recovery; and also the sincerest sympathy from all at the illness of Mr. A. D. Hall, who was in hospital. "The Visitors" was proposed by N. D. McIntosh, who pointed out the great indebtedness of the School to Dr. C. J. Bradfield, who was always ready at all times to give every assistance possible in connection with the School; and to Mr. H. W. Hixson, who considered it always labour of love to render what assistance he could in promoting the welfare of the School. Dr. Bradfield, in responding, gave a history of the "Bridge," and enumerated the benefits that would accrue to the School on the completion of the

great undertaking, pointing out that it would then be a question of only seven minutes' travel from the centre of the city to the School. Short responses were also given by the Rev. D. Davies and Messrs. J. L. Pulling, H. H. Dixon, J. O. Harris, and A. H. Yarnold. It was decided that a cable be sent to the Archbishop expressing sympathy with him in his illness, and the hope of a quick recovery. The singing of "Auld Lang Syne" and the National Anthem brought the evening to an end.

R. R. King and W. J. Maclean have been admitted by the Full Court to practise as solicitors of the Supreme Court. R. King has joined the firm of Colquhoun, King, and Richards, of Dalton House.

On the occasion of Mr. Allan Ramsay's recent marriage a number of Old Boys, who had been associated with him in the various School crews, presented him with a cheque, and conveyed to him their congratulations and best wishes.

V. H. Treatt has been admitted to practise as a barrister. Mr. Justice James congratulated him on his distinguished University career.

Treatt matriculated in 1915, gaining an exhibition in Arts and Law. Enlisting in 1916, he served as a gunner in the A.I.F., and was

awarded the military medal. He returned in May, 1919, and in March of the following year took his B.A. degrees at the Sydney University, gaining the Wigram-Allen Scholarship and the Pitt-Cobbett Prize. He was awarded the Rhodes Scholarship for New South Wales in 1920, and took his degrees of B.A. and B.C.L. in the Honours School at Oxford. He was called to the Bar by the Society of Lincoln's Inn in April, 1923. He returned to Sydney as welfare officer on the *Bendigo*, which brought out four hundred and thirty-nine immigrants.

The following extract is from the *Sydney Sun*, 17/3/20:—

Mr. Treatt said that he considered his residence for three years in England had been of great benefit to him.

"At Oxford," he said, "you meet daily Americans, Canadians, South Africans, New Zealanders, and other Australians. Clubs and committees were formed among these strangers, and problems vital to the Dominions are discussed. The other man's point of view is invaluable to an Australian. It makes him realise that Australia is not the only country with vital problems to be attended to.

"I travelled all over Europe, and spent considerable time in Germany and Austria. The League of Nations has put Austria on her feet again.

"I am very keen about the League of Nations' work. Every year the League gets half a dozen Rhodes scholars to speak throughout England concerning its aims and ideals. I was one of those chosen last year, and spent a month in the North of England lecturing.

"The Oxford accent?—well, it exists, and after three years I fancy I can detect

an Oxford man now; but I have come back to Australia still with the typical Australian accent—so my English relatives tell me. An out-and-out Australian can never lose his accent."

Peter Macintyre writes from the Equitation School, Weedon, Northbanks, on November 2:—

I was one of those privileged to see the great centenary match at Rugby School, England and Wales v. Scotland and Ireland, on the big side-ground. I have no doubt people will wonder that so few people were present at the game, but the school authorities were a bit hard about the issue of the tickets, which were confined to old Rugbeians and members of the Rugby Union and affiliated clubs. It was a great game, as you will have seen from the reports in the *Times* and other papers. It was a pity it was not played on one of the international grounds. Rugby enthusiasts should have been given a better opportunity of seeing the thirty best players of the four countries. Presumably the chance will not occur again for a hundred years. I suppose a cleaner, harder, and perhaps a faster game has never been played anywhere. Wakefield is the greatest forward in the four countries, easily, to my mind. Scottish halves, Bryce and Dykes, are very little inferior to Davies and Kershaw. Crawford, the Irishman, is a great full-back.

The following is a resume of the game as given in the London *Times*, kindly sent by Macintyre:—"The scene of William Webb Ellis' famous exploit did not lend itself to the tumultuous atmosphere of a Twickenham or an Iverleith, but as the two thousand privileged spectators included eight hundred Rugby schoolboys, and the game was worthy of the occasion—as, of course, it simply had to be—there was excitement enough and to spare. The meeting of these combined teams did not

fail to produce a remarkable game of moods and mannerisms, with spells of the most amazing scoring activity and a magnificent finish. England and Wales were rather the cleverer side, and they won by rather a few points, but even a close analysis of the scoring does not reveal how desperately near they were to defeat during the last twenty minutes; nor how splendidly they pulled themselves together. Honours, in fact, were practically easy, but England and Wales scored twenty-one points, made up of two goals, two dropped goals, and one try, to Scotland and Ireland's sixteen points, made up of two goals and two tries. The match was due to be started at 2.30, but as that momentous half-hour was sounded by the school clock, it was Mr. Jiggle—unknown only to the hapless visitor from afar—who first appeared on the scene. Mr. Jiggle slowly, and with the aid of his stick, marched to the centre of the field, where he solemnly planted the ball—as he had done in every Rugby school match for many a long year. Grandstands, of course, there were none, and the Rugby boys, who were forced to sit down along one side of the field, were provided with a liberal stretch of tarpaulin ground sheets. Most of the other spectators stood, but the "swells" of an earlier generation—there were present men who had played in the first international match on record—were provided with chairs and garden seats. A homely scene enough, but none the less memorable for all that."

J. Neville Cohen writes that one thing that impressed him in travelling in New Zealand was the various school uniforms. All the boys were compelled to wear a suit of certain material and colour, also to wear short trousers, which reached to the knees. Their shirts were of grey flannel, open at the neck. They were

not allowed to wear a felt hat, but must don straw hats when going out, and this made their appearance ever so much neater. In all his travels, he adds, he had not struck a school which had the dignity and records possessed by 'Shore.

Clifford S. Ross points out that his rank of "squadron commander," as given in the Roll of Honour, is correct in itself, that being his appointment in the Royal Flying Corps and Royal Air Force, but is not his military or air force rank. The former is "major" and the latter is "squadron leader," the former being the rank under which he is now addressed by the Secretary of the War Office, London.

Canada, 2/1/24.

Dear Mr. Davies,—

Did you ever expect to get a letter from a lonely bachelor farmer miles from anywhere on the Canadian Prairie? Well, the postscript from my brother is my excuse for writing to you.

In 1902 I was a skinny little boy in Holmes' class, and even now I almost tremble when I think of him. How well I remember the trip over the Harbour, and how we hoped we would miss the tram at McMahon's Point, so as to have an excuse.

In all my years of wandering I have never met anyone from Sydney, except sailors, who used to sleep in the Domain.

How I should enjoy a trip on the old Parramatta on boat race day! North Shore against Sydney Grammar, or a footer match against King's School!

Came to Canada in 1903, and after roaming around a number of years, settled down here to farm. Really, if we get many more poor years in this district I think I shall have to do the "Prodigal Son" act. A hard but healthy life, with no riches; work to the end. My father is still in action, a fine healthy, well-preserved man, whom I have not seen since 1903.

I do wish just now for a little Australian summer heat to mix with this 30 deg. below zero weather—a real hot stove, and yet the windows covered with ice. Nice and cosy, just the same inside. All day I have been working outside, and could keep warm, all except my Roman nose, and that needed frequent rubbing to keep from freezing.

When I put my thinking cap on I can remember my North Shore School days very plainly, and can place all the masters. I remember when B—— put "Guinea-pig" Wilson over his knees and spanked him. Roscoe, our drawing master, reported me to the "Head" for drawing a caricature of him. I was let off with a lecture. The little "tuck shop" outside the gate! The old water cistern, where we day boys generally eat our dinner. It all comes back to me. Well, before I roll into my bunk I will see if my old fiddle can produce the old tune, "Here's to the fellow."

Remember me kindly to Messrs. Baker and Hall, and the School.

P.S. (from Selwyn Jackson).—Some days ago I had a notice asking me to at-

tend a dinner of the old North Shore boys. We met last night at the Holborn Restaurant, with Mr. Robson in the chair. Apparently this is the first time such a thing has been thought of. Presumably, since there are about thirty-seven Old Boys now in the United Kingdom, it is going to be an annual affair, and there are hopes of getting really "Old Boys" next time, once the thing has started. S.C.E.G.S. OLD BOYS' CLUB.

At the first annual meeting on March 6th, the Club was formally opened by the Headmaster. There were 70 members present, and the meeting was most enthusiastic. Mr. A. B. S. White was in the chair. The Honorary Secretary, Mr. G. C. Turnbull, read the following report:—

Your Committee begs to report as follows:—

At a meeting of Old Boys held at the School on March 8, 1923, it was decided to form an Old Boys' Club, provided 350 members could be obtained. A committee was formed consisting of D. B. Carver, S. W. Crane, A. A. Heath, N. D. McIntosh and Dudley Williams. Since this date G. C. Turnbull and R. C. Cox have joined the committee.

The required number of 350 was reached about the middle of November, 1923, and on November 26 your committee, having heard of the present premises, through the kindness of Mr. Gibson (Secretary of the Grammar School Club), decided to lease them for a term of twelve months with an option of a renewal for a further twelve months. Your committee only entered into the short lease because it was anticipated that a new building would shortly be commenced at the corner of Hunter and Phillip Streets, on the top floor of which accommodation would be provided for all the G.P.S. Clubs; but your committee now understands that this site has been re-sold, and the proposal shelved for the time being. Your committee, however, has been informed by the present lessors that an extension of the lease beyond two years can be obtained if desired.

After the present premises had been taken it was necessary to have them

painted and papered, and to have the whole of the furniture and fittings made. Some delay was also caused by the Christmas and New Year holidays, but the club was made available to members on January 14th. Since the club was opened a number of new members have joined, so that the total membership now amounts to 420; of this number, however, only 275 have so far paid their subscriptions.

The committee cannot too strongly impress upon members the necessity of punctual payment of fees if a club run on a small subscription like this one is to carry on. Provided members subscribe promptly, the committee feel confident that the club can be financed on the present subscription.

If a membership of 500 were obtained, and in the event of the project for combining the various G.P.S. clubs falling through, the committee could very possibly obtain a lease of the two back rooms of the present flat, convert them into one, and instal a billiard table. The committee has new stocks of club writing pads and envelopes, cigarettes and matches on hand, which can be purchased at current rates.

So far only four names have been received of members desiring to lunch regularly together; the committee consider that about twelve names, at least, are required before any arrangements can be made.

This and other matters are, however, for the incoming committee. The present committee, apart from dealing with matters connected strictly with the formation of the club, has only made provisional arrangements pending the election of the regular committee. A matter for this committee will be the installation of a telephone, which appears to be required.

A constitution was adopted, and the following members were elected office-bearers:—President, Mr. Dudley Williams; Vice-President, Mr. N. Y. Deane; Hon. Secretary, Mr. G. C. Turnbull; Hon. Treasurer, Mr. N. D. McIntosh; Committee: Messrs. G. E. Browne, S. W. Crane, Dr. G. R. Hamilton, Messrs. J. G. Hill, W. J. S. Harding, L. C. Hutchinson, Dr. F. G. A. Pockley, and Mr. D'Arcy Roberts; Hon. Auditor, Mr. N. E. Brookes.

There are now 331 financial members, and the committee is making every effort to increase this number to 500 before the end of the year. This should easily be achieved if Old Boys give the club the support it deserves. The response from Old Boys in the country, both in New South Wales and Queensland, has been very gratifying to the Committee, and several country members visiting town have expressed their appreciation of the club.

The club premises, which are situated on the 1st floor of Cromer, Phillip Street, and at present consist of a reading room, card room, bath room and office, are comfortably furnished, and the committee is making every endeavour to obtain another room and install a billiard table.

During the year, the club hopes to hold smoke concerts and other reunions. The "Rainbow, Dandies,"

who are mostly S.C.E.G.S. supporters, from Hunter's Hill, have promised the club a concert in the Conservatorium towards the end of August or September.

The committee elected Rev. D. Davies, Messrs. L. A. Baker, A. D. Hall and C. H. Linton to honorary Life Membership, and have asked the remaining masters to accept honorary membership for the ensuing year.

The committee hopes that any Old Boys who have not already joined the club will make every effort to do so. Subscriptions £1/1/-, and entrance fee £1/1/-, may be sent to the Hon. Treasurer, Noel D. McIntosh, c/o H. E. McIntosh Esq., 32 B.M.A. Buildings, Elizabeth Street, Sydney; or to the Hon. Secretary, G. E. Turnbull, S.C.E.G.S. Old Boys' Club, Cromer, Phillip Street, Sydney.

The committee has decided to make the first Tuesday night of every month a special club night, when cards will be played, and a light supper provided at a moderate charge. The first of these evenings will be held on Tuesday, June 3rd. It is hoped members will turn up well, and will bring with them as visitors Old Boys who have not already joined.

Negotiations are in hand with the Café Ecossais to have a table reserved in the back room, where members may have lunch together.
