At the meeting of the Standing Committee of Synod held on February 25, Rev. E. F. N. Cash was elected a member of the Council in place of Rev. F. W. Tugwell (resigned), and Rev. O. G. Dent in the place of Rev. W. G. Hilliard (resigned).

The Boat Club Dance was held this year on Friday, May 3, at the Warringah Hall.

The Drill Squad was successful in winning the Kirby Shield at the annual Military Sports at the Show Ground on April 13. The Squad did not drill by any means up to

SPEECH DAY, 1928.

Thursday, December 13, was Speech Day. The Archbishop presided, and Sir Henry Braddon was the guest of the day. A large number of parents, Old Boys, and other friends of the School, was present, and a fine day provided the setting for a pleasant afternoon.

The first event of the day was the inspection of the guard of honour, commanded by Captain E. Mander Jones, which was drawn up on the lawn near the Chapel. This was followed by the usual short Chapel service.

After Chapel, the rest of the day's proceedings took place in the marquee on the ground.

The Archbishop spoke briefly opening the proceedings, and welcomed Sir Henry Braddon.

The Headmaster then read the tollowing report:-

My Lord Archbishop, Sir Henry Braddon, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I extend a welcome to your Grace on heliaff of the School. We know that, as President of our Council, you are much more than ordinarily interested in our affairs, and are delighted that you have been able to spare the time to be here.

I also welcome Sir Henry Braddon as one whom the School is proud to claim as an old friend.

: I have the honour to submit my report of the activities of the School for the past year. - It has been a year of varying fortunes; but the general average has been very satisfactory. If the number of applications for enrolment is any indication of sound service to the community, then we may reasonably feel that we are doing good work. At the beginning of the year we were compelled to refuse a considerable number of applications, and I find myself again in the same position. It is pleasant in one sense, but not without embarrassment. would be a great help if those who have a relation to the School, such as Old Boys and parents of Old Boys, were to forward applications on behalf of their sons in It is a really worrying emgood time. barrassment to be faced with the alternative of disappointing a friend of the School or filling a class beyond its reasonable limit. The number on the roll this year, including those who were enrolled for part of the year only, is 660.

The passes in the Public Examinations were quite up to the standard of past Thirty boys gained the Leaving Certificate, and 70 gained the Intermediate We did not hope for great Certificate. things from the majority of our Leaving candidates, but had great faith in the best boys: we were not surprised by the results, for there were, on the one hand, more hare passes than usual, but on the other hand we secured the top place in the examination. T. Dunhabin closed a brilliant school carrer by sharing the-Prize for General Proficiency, which carries with it the John West Medal, the Grahame Prize, and the Aitken Scholarship; in addition, he won the Cooper Scholarship for Classics, and showed his wide range of ability by gaining first class honours in Mathematics. He should have a brilliant University career. can now proudly claim to have won the first place among male Leaving candidates

for four of the last five years; it is a claim which ought to be made while the average is still good. Passes of high morit were also obtained by D. M. Myers, J. G. Phillips, and R. F. Weisener. Myers secured first class honours in Physics and Mathematics, and A's in his remaining subjects.

The passes in the Intermediate were of distinctly good standard throughout. The boys were of more than ordinary ability, and obtained the results which might have been expected of them. Makinson secured A's in all his seven subjects, and Hole, Thane, and Wood were awarded six A's and a B.

The general standard of work in the School has been satisfactory in many respects, but there is, of course, ample room for improvements in others. There will not be a long honours list in the Leaving Certificate results; however, Bradfield and Barnes are two very sound scholars, and are entirely worthy winners of the chief. The Intermediate results school prizes. may be expected to be good. The Upper Fourth Forms deserve praise for the keenness with which they have attacked their work during the year, a keenness which was not solely due to the fact that an examination was ahead of them. Lower Fourth and Third Forms are very uneven in standard; one can only hope that their "tail-enders" will exceed expectations like those of the English Eleven-the opening batsmen, at least, are quite up to the best standard. work of the Preparatory School has been well organised by Mr. Walmsley, and there is every justification for confidence in the sound preparation which the younger boys are receiving. .

The School's record in sport during the year has been highly satisfactory beyond all question. The first football and athletic teams did not shine, although they held to their tasks with great determination. However, their lack of success was counterbalanced by the good performances in rowing, rifle shooting and cricket, and by the successes of the lower teams. We

won the G.P.S. Premierships in rowing and rifle shooting, and were a good third in cricket. In the second grade competitions we won in rowing, football and rifle shooting, and were a close second in cricket and junior athletics.

The cricket team did not find its best form in the first term, but performed better in the third term. Of the fourteen competition matches, five were lost and nine won. The second team won seven matches, lost two, and two were drawn very much in their favour. Both teams were of good standard. The cricket of the lower teams was very fair, but not as good as usual.

The First Fifteen again had a disappointing season, and their results were not a true indication of the keenness with which they played. They won one match and lost five; they showed fine form against two of the leading teams, but failed against some of the weaker ones. Their record was to some extent counterbalanced by the fine performance of the Second Fifteen in winning the Second Competition without losing a Grade Throughout the season they set match. a fine example of "team spirit." Third and Lower Fifteens were also of distinctly good standard.

The crews took the advice to heart, and went to work with confidence and determination. The Eight's win in its beat was not so spectacular, but was probably a better effort than the win in the final; the conditions were very strongly against them, but they coolly maintained their length and exhibited really good form in the rough water. The First Four deserve special praise for their magnificent effort in the final, when they pulled up from behind and showed fine grit. Second Four had no need to show qualities other than good rowing, because they were much better than their opponents. The Third and Fourth Fours also deserve a full measure of praise. They were compelled to do most of their training on the almost impossible water of Barry's Bay, which is nowadays often like the open However, they had made up their minds that their task was to give encouragement to the Regatta crews by winning in the morning. I firmly believe that they cared much more for this than for winning for their own sakes. I think this is a fine spirit, and commend it heartily to all junior teams. The most pleasing feature of our wins is that they were obtained by good rowing, though it may not appear very modest on our part to say so. We have always had the reputation of turning out good crews which have tried to master the art and science of oarsmanship: for it is both an art and a science. It is sincerely to be hoped that we may in the future guard jealously our tradition of style, for the rhythmic joy of rowing can only be experienced when a reasonable measure of perfection has been attained.

The results in athletics were all that could be expected from the ability of the team. There were few naturally good senior runners, but they were well trained; they occupied fourth place. The Junior Team was a really good one, but was heaten by a better team from Newington. The School sports were quite successful. It is unfortunate that so many heats must be run off beforehand, because only a limited number can take part on the sports day; however, it would be impos-

sible to manage the events otherwise. Very successful challenge tests were arranged for training purposes with Newington College, the University, and Knox Grammar School. In all our own meetings the organisation was very good, and the master in charge and the sub-committee deserve our thanks.

The rifle shooting teams had a very good year. The First Team won the Rawson Cup and N.R.A. Shield, gaining the G.P.S. Premiership. The Second . Team tied with The King's School for The consistently good refirst place. sults in shooting during the last few years are due to keen practice and to expert coaching. Shooting makes far more demands upon time and unselfishness than many realise as practice has to be carried out at such times as may not clash with other fixtures.

The standard reached by the tennis teams was good. The annual fixture with Sydney Grammar School was held on Eight-Hour Day at "Fairwater." We thank Lady Fairfax for her hospitality, the more as we realise the trial through which she had passed not long before. By winning the match, the School regained the Fairwater Cup. Various tournaments have been conducted, and have been keenly contested.

Swimming and boxing have each had their place. The carnival was held in March, and the boxing tournament a few days ago.

The House competitions have been carried out as usual. An alteration was made in the scheme of football by excluding members of the first four School teams from participation in House football. The result was beneficial, as the practice of the School teams was freed from interruption, and younger boys were given a greater incentive to enthusiasm. The football was won by Barry House, cricket by School House, rowing by Robers on and School House, athletics by School shooting by Barry, swimming by Robson, and boxing by Robson. The Simpson

Cup for the Premier House was won by School House.

The East Window arrived from Lingland in November, and was at once placed in position in the Chapel. A great deal of time and trouble has been expended in securing a fitting design, and in arranging for its execution. The final result is a work of art of undeniable beauty, worthy of the purpose to which it will be dedicated, namely, the commemoration of the services of Old Boys of the School to the It is the work of Edward Woore, of Hammersmith, and is the only example of his work in Australia. placing of the order and the supervision of the manufacture were entrusted to Mr. Matthew Dawson, an Old Boy architect of considerable artistic reputation in Eng-We cannot place too high a value upon the service which Mr. Dawson has rendered to the School; it has been evident from his letters that he has taken the deepest interest in the matter, and that he has given an enormous amount of his own time. This he did freely as a gift to the School, and a most valuable and acceptable gift it has been. Chapel has already made a deep appeal to the boys who have passed through the School since it was built. The success of the window is to be measured in terms of the strength which it adds to this appeal, and I believe that in this sense it will add something of incalculable importance to our life. The dignity of the design and the loftiness of the theme cannot fail to awaken noble thoughts and We should like those who inspirations. contributed a few years ago-and not the least of these is Mr. Davies himself-to know that they have rendered a very great service to the School. The carving of the remaining stone work was also completed by the School Council during. the year.

Apart from the usual daily services, many special services have been held. The Open Sundays have been held as usual, and our accommodation has been taxed to the limit. Special services were

held on Anzac Day and on Armistice Day, and week day addresses have been given on missionary and other topics. On many occasions the addresses have been of a very high quality indeed, and have left a lasting impression; we owe our thanks to the various visitors who have honoured us by taking the opportunity so seriously. Confirmation was given by the Bishop Coadjutor to 78 candidates on October 26; the preparation was well conducted and attentively received, and the service was impressive as could have been wished.

The School Fete was revived this year with results which exceeded the hopes of the most optimistic. We have always considered ourselves fortunate in possessing a body of supporters of exceptional energy and keenness. However, this year they rallied to the School in a manner almost beyond thanks. The preparations for the Fete went forward quietly but continuously for some months beforehand, and the day itself was a revelation. proceeds in eash were £1,805—a record far in advance of the previous best. over, this year more than ever before, it was realised that the value of the Fete to the School is not financial only. provides an opportunity for parents of past, present and future boys, and for all who value the School, to meet on a ground The good which this of common interest. intercourse brings to the School is not easy to estimate, but is considerable. owe a heavy debt of gratitude to the executive officers, the stall-holders and their helpers, and especially to Mr. Russell Sinclair, Mrs. Esplin and Miss Rhodes, whose organisation at the centre of things I express my own apprewas flawless. ciation of the assistance given by the masters before and during the Fete; all undertook tasks—some of them of consid-'erable magnitude-and I appreciate highly y, the keenness with which they carried them The boys also deserve mention. It is a day of fun for them, and a little license might perhaps be tolerated; not only was none taken, but they helped before, during, and after the Fete with a

willingness and cuthusiasm which caused me to appreciate their good points even more than I generally do.

The proceeds of the Fete will again bedevoted to the Ground and the Boat Shed. The improvement of the main oval during the last few years has been very great, as a result of heavy top-dressing and constant work. It is now proposed to treat the lower flat, bit by bit, in a similar manner. Indeed, the work was begun two months ago. The results of a quite considerable expenditure are not soon noticed in this kind of work, and are dependent largely upon the weather. If we have the same luck as with the main oval, we shall do well. The work is not being undertaken before it is needed, as the lower ground was in poor condition this winter. In other respects the ground is making steady progress. The work of maintenance and repair is, of course, quite a considerable one. Boat Shed has been improved by a fewminor additions; here also repairs to the structure make a constant call.

The health of the boarders during the year has been, on the whole, good. have not been free from the epidemic diseases which seem to have been very severe throughout the State, but the number of cases has been relatively few. had cases of mumps and measles in Second Term, and a very few cases of mumps The more serious troubles this term. have fortunately passed us by, and, on the whole. I think we have escaped lightly. In every case great care has been exercised, and the spread of the disease checked as well as could have been honed.

The work which the School has undertaken in connection with Holy Trinity, Erskineville, has progressed continuously. Mr. Backhouse has given a very great deal of time to the work, and has been freely assisted by other masters. The number of volunteers from among the boys has been so great that it has been found possible to carry out similar work at St. Matthias', Paddington. Several

The military training which is carried out at the School is ably handled by masters, under the command of Major The discipline maintained has very real effect on the discipline of the School, and trouble is taken to make the work interesting. The boys from the School who attended the militia camp in September won high praise for their efficiency, and carried off the honours in a field firing competition. A squad was entered for the drill competition at the Annual Military Sports in April, and again won the Kirby Shield; indeed, we have won this competition nearly every The guard which was on year recently. parade this afternoon is another example of the provision of an incentive for keen work; their efficiency is good considering the limited opportunities which they have had for training. The School has every reason to appreciate the valuable work done by the officers concerned.

In recent years complaints have often been made that the date of the Intermediate Examination is a most unsuitable one. It is commenced about a month before, and completed about a fortnight before the end of the last School The time which remains after the examination is too short for the breaking of fresh ground, and much too long to be wasted; accordingly boys who have done the Intermediate finish the year in such conditions that it is hard for them to feel a keen interest or incentive. The general result is distinctly bad for them.

Old Boys who were interested in the Club few years ago the number who treated the examination as the end of the year was considerable, and an appeal is now made to parents before the examination cach year to co-operate with the staff in seeing that the remaining time is put to good use. The request meets in general with the satisfactory response which might be expected. Even now, however, there are more absences during this last fortnight than can be explained in a reasonable way. These absences, though they may seen of little account from the point of view of the individual, are a serious interference with the work of the I shall not have to make this small grumble for more than one year more, as the Board of Examiners has decided to change the date of the examination from the year 1930 onwards. unfortunate fact is, however, that instead of putting it at the end of the year, they propose to put it in September-an even worse time than the present date from our point of view: The reason given is that the work of administration cannot be handled in the time available at pre-No doubt the Board must consider first the interests of the Department. There are three courses open to us. may prepare boys for the examination in September, or we may cease to send any candidates, or we may hold an examination of our own. The first alternative would mean our altering the arrangement of the entire School year, for the reason, among many others, that our holidays are I am not in favour of in Scotember. abandoning entirely an external examination at the half-way stage represented by the Intermediate: for one thing, it is good for boys at this stage of their work to have a high hurdle to take. Гhе Headmasters of the G.P.S., after considering the whole question, decided to exploit fully the third alternative. They accordingly have in mind the helding of and we examination similar in standard at the very end of the year, commencing in 1930; ~ and have sinvited the Headmasters and Headmistresses of other non-departmental

schools to join them. If the scheme can be carried out—and there do not appear to be any insurmountable difficulties—it will bring with it many advantages.

The year's work in the Preparatory School has been successful in every important respect. Since its establishment, enthusiasm has been most marked in every activity, and this year is no exception. The standard of work attained has been highly satisfactory, and the conduct of the boys both in and out of School hours has been such as to show the real value of a share in the tradition of the School. Games have been carried out as usual. both in the quarter competition and against other Schools. Physical drill takes place daily under the Sergeant-Major, and reaches a very high standard for such young boys. Those who witnessed the display of drill at the Preparatory School Sports were, I think, impressed alike by the value of the work and by the standard attained. We are so assured of the usefulness of physical drill and of games in this section of the School that they are held to be part of the regular curriculum, and absence is only excused on the ground of illness. The results of the quarter competitions for the year placed Davies as the premier quarter; the individual competitions were won by Linton in cricket, Davies in foothall, athletics and swimming, and Baker in drill.

The branch of the Heralds of the King has been maintained as well as usual, the 120 odd boys having contributed regularly by denying themselves little things here and there, and have at the end of the year well over £50 to distribute to charitable funds. In every respect Mr. Walmsley and the masters have cause for great satisfaction with the year's work.

The profects have done their work very well during the year. They have their routine duties, of course, but their chief task is to carry out the promise which they make at their appointment "to do their best to maintain the good name of

the School, both, by their own example and by their influence over others." Their responsibility is no light one, and upon their view of it the tone of the School depends to a very great extent. They have been boys of entirely sound character, and, in some cases, of strong One has felt that the inpersonality. terests of the School have meant much to them, and have been safe in their They will have their reward keeping. in the increased strength of character which comes with the exercise of responsibility.

There will be only one change in the Staff for next year. Mr. Ashton is wisely taking advantage of an opportunity of going to Oxford, and will carry our best wishes with him. He will be replaced by Mr. E. B. Lester, a Master of Arts who graduated with Honours at Melbourne University, and has been on the staff of the Geelong Grammar School. Mr. Harris, who has unfortunately not enjoyed the best of health recently, is relinquishing the charge of Robson House. He has not spared himself in the service of the School, and is one of its main-All friends of the School will unite in wishing him better health in circonstances which will make less exacting Mr. Dixon will demands on his energies. take charge of the House next year.

This year I owe specially warm thanks to the Staff. Several of us including Mr. Dixon and myself, have been forced to ask for sick leave at various times. The extra work has in every case been shouldered willingly and efficiently. The routine duties which occupy School hours are only a small part of the tasks which fall upon a schoolmaster. Success depends upon disinterested service, and such service has been freely given.

To the School Council, my colleagues and I express our thanks for wise and careful government, and for the keen interest which they have taken in all the affairs of the School. At the conclusion of the Headmaster's report, Sir Henry Braddon spoke briefly, stating at the beginning that he had the comments of his own sons to guide him in the length and quality of speeches suitable to the occasion. On the conclusion of his speech he distributed the prizes.

At the end of the ceremony the company was entertained at afternoon tea.

THE SYDNEY UNIVERSITY APPOINTMENTS BOARD.

It may interest boys who are going up for the Leaving Certificate to know what avenues the University opens to employment.

Some men, of course, when they go up to the University, have a definite profession in view, and take a course which will fit them directly for that chosen profession. The courses which lead directly to a profession are Law, Medicine, Dentistry, Veterinary Science, and Architecture. Armed with a degree in one of these faculties, the professional man may join battle with the world as an individual combatant, and may try to prevail on it to supply him with bread and butter in return for the exercise of his skill.

Other courses do not lead so directly to immediate occupation. The public does not generally encourage newly fledged engineers to practise as consultants, nor does it place them at once at the head of large enterprises. The Engineering Graduate must seek an opening in the service of a firm or public body.

Courses in Arts. Science, Econo-

mics, and Agriculture do not lead directly to professions. However. in trade and industry there are numerous openings for graduates in Science and Economics, and there is a real though limited field for graduates in Agriculture. In Arts, too, there are many openings quite apart from the teaching profession, which suggests itself as obvious. who take up Arts without any clear intentions as to their future career would do well to consider these alternative openings.

It is to assist students in the solution of their difficulties in these matters that the University has estab-Appointments Board. lished an which will serve to eliminate much of the trial and error in finding a position. It is the University leaflet dealing with this subject for the information of freshmen that has suggested these remarks. who intend going up to the University would do well to consider them, and to make themselves acquainted with the information put out by the University itself.

During the term rain interfered with practice considerably, and with most matches. This was particularly unfortunate, as the team was rather a young one and very inexperienced. However, only The King's School match was lost, and we finished the term second on the competition table.

The batting at the beginning of the term was very weak, and it was only by accurate bowling, backed up by splendid fielding, that the earlier matches were won. Indeed, our totals in the first two or three matches would have been deplorable only for the consistency and doggedness of Falk, who made the highest score in every match that he played for the team. His average for the term was 46.

G.P.S. REGATTA.

The news of the Regatta must necessarily be brief, as the "Torch-Bearer" is in the press as these lines are written. For record purposes, the detailed results will be published in the next issue. However, the crews have made history this year, not in so brilliant a fashion as in 1928, but in a manner which is perhaps just as remarkable, and it is most desirable that some description should be given, however hastily it must be written.

The training period this year has been as happy as ever, and as successful in every way. The Christmas Camp was slightly longer than usual, but none felt that it was too long, and to all concerned it provided perhaps the most enjoyable ending possible to the holidays. The Eight and the First and Second Fours worked on continuously during the Term, and, as usual, Third and Fourth Fours were selected to work at Berry's Bay. A great im-

provement in arrangements was made during the last month by bringing the latter two crews to Gladesville. They were thus able to enjoy more fully the last portion of their preparation. In addition to these crews, two crews of cricketers and others have been working in "clinker" boats at Berry's Bay since the end of the cricket season. By all accounts, they have enjoyed thoroughly their aquatic experiences, and have taken to the new element with enthusiasm. At the time of writing, they have not come under the critical eye of the approved "wet-bobs."

All crews proved exceedingly satisfactory in training, and the fours seemed to be quite up to the crews **a**of 1928 by any standard of comparison. 2 It is easy to say that the Eight seemed to be better than that of 1928, but the statement might not carry conviction in view of the fact that they were not tested. ever, it is only fair to them to say that, judging by times, and performances against other crews, they were at least the equal of last year's winners. Their rows on the Friday. Saturday, and Monday preceding the race were exceedingly good. and the camp on Monday night was most happy and hopeful.

On Tuesday morning, the day before the heats, the first event of a regular chapter of accidents ocentred, when Mackay was found to have a feverish cold, and Commins also had to report sick. Mackay spent the day in bed, but his temperature disappeared on Wednesday morning and he was able to row in the afternoon. Commins was also apparently better, and took his place in the Second Four. During the day, however, Miller and Harris were both far from well, but had no signs of identifiable illness.

The heats passed satisfactorily for all but the Second Four. Commins rowed most gallantly, but was physically unable to do himself justice. The crew came last, but in finishing within four lengths of the winners under the conditions they did remarkably well. The First Four rowed into second place by a narrow The Eight rowed really margin. well, but as three members of the crew were not entirely fit, they were content to qualify with a low rate. Newington, rowing from 32 to 33 down the course, won by half to three-quarters of a length from our erew, which rowed from 28 to 29 throughout: the other starters were well behind.

The wisdom of a steady race was evident when the erew came in, as Miller and Harris both showed clear signs of a fever similar to that of Mackay. As the latter had quite recovered, there was no reason for a scrious view of the trouble at the time. Both went to bed, but the illness persisted. In any case, it was too rough to row on Thursday or Friday, so that it was not possible to consider trying out a crew with substitutes. On Friday morning it became clear that Harris could not row, and in the same evening Miller's fate was similarly sealed.

A word about the spirit of the crew under these misfortunes is no more than their just due, and is indeed necessary if the School is to gain inspiration from their sterling example. There was, of course, a sinking of the heart, but it was at once replaced by a cheery and buoydetermination which should make us all proud. It was determined that bow and 2 (Menzies and Mackay) would row 7 and stroke, that Lincoln (3) would go to bow, and Vivers and Finley, of the Second Four, would row 3 and 2. It should be recorded that these selections were made not in order to preserve the First Four intact, but because they were considered to be the most suitable. Without rowing experience, it is difficult to realise what these changes involved. a tremendous task to row stroke or 7 in an eight for the first time, and an even more difficult one to accommodate oneself to the speed of an eight after rowing in a four. zies and Mackay had scarcely ever rowed elsewhere than at bow and 2, and Finley and Vivers had never even sat in an eight before. to these facts the additional one, that owing to rough water, only a ten-minute trial of the new crew was possible on Saturday morning, and it will readily be understood that no one but the crew itself expected the eight to be within lengths at the

finish. The crew, however, never allowed themselves to be downhearted for a moment. To make matters worse, Mahoney (bow of the First Four) developed the same wretched complaint on Saturday morning, and it was judged unwise to row him. Eastaugh was moved up from the Third Four, but the crew, if they caught the infection of 'flu from the Eight, also were infected with the same buoyant spirit.

The wind in the afternoon was a very boisterous southerly, and the coaches spent an anxious time wondering what might befall their scratch crews. The Eight had drawn the worst possible station on the northern bank, and it was thought quite possible that they might encounter trouble with the rough water. However, fortunately they were able to tow the boat up safely, and the wind moderated a little for the race.

All fears were dispelled as the The First Four races proceeded. rowed into third place, and showed grit and determination which deserve the highest praise. The Eight rose to the occasion in a really wonderful manner. At Putney they were approximately level with High and Grammar, although Newington at this stage had a three-quarter length lead. As they moved down the course, it was expected that they would fall away. However. though for obvious reasons they could not hit as high a rate as the other crews, they held to them marvellously. After a mile Newington and High had moved comfortably ahead, but they still continued to lead Grammar. In the last halfmile they actually managed to maintain a sprint, but they were not able to keep Grammar behind them in the last hundred yards. The race was won by High by three feet from Newington, with Grammar two and a half lengths behind, and Shore six feet behind Grammar.

This hasty description easily be interpreted as an excuse for defeat, or a detraction from the performances of the placed crews. If so, it would be an unfortunate misrepresentation of the feelings which have been expressed in the The performances of the 1929 crews under adverse circumestances rank among the very best performances of our past teams and crews, and it is only right that the "Torch-Bearer" should place on record at once an appreciation, and that past and present boys should be able to realise that defeat as well as victory may have its glories. letter from an Old Bov may be quoted, and its sentiment will find an echo in the minds of many who saw the race. He writes: "I have seen nearly all of the Schools' boat races since 1891, and have cheered with much joy when we have won, but I was never more thrilled than by the wonderful defeat which our crews suffered vesterday. If was magnificent. The School and crew can always look back on that

mighty, plucky effort with the greatest pride, and it will be an incentive for future generations to live up to the tradition which has been set. Well did they all perform their task and carry on the flaming torch down the line of the School's history. When we sing the old song together, the verse, 'Here's to the fellow who never says die,' will always recall to my mind the great race of 1929.''

The following is the Annual Report and Balance Sheet:—

1. Your Committee has much pleasure in submitting the report of the work of the Union for the year 1926-27.

2. Membership shows a slight decrease for the year, being 1,159 as against 1,218 for last year, but this is mainly due to the fact that a large number of names were removed from the roll on the ground that subscriptions were too long overdue. In the past, members have been allowed a certain amount of latitude in the payment of their subscriptions, but it was found that the expense was not warranted when reminders were not heeded. Prompt payments and immediate notification of

change of address will benefit the Union as a whole.

3. Although it is a comparatively small decrease in the membership of the Union, interest in the Union's activities has greatly diminished. Your Committee has throughout the year endeavoured to be of as much service as possible, not only to the Old Boys, but to the School. Every service to the Old Boys, however, has met with a very weak response.

4. The Annual Dinner was arranged for Friday, April 20, but owing to only 23 nominations being received, it was necessary to cancel it at the last minute. It was noticeable that of the 23 nominations, the majority were your office-bearers. As against this, dinners were held in Melbourne and Adelaide by the Old Boys resident in those cities, and proved great successes. Once again the success was due to the organisers of the functions, Messrs. Boehme and Moodie, and your Committee in indebted to them for their interest.

5. On June 9 the Annual Football Match was played against the School at Northbridge, and, in response to the circular, 16 names were received.

6. The Annual Dance was held at the Ambassadors on July 4 in order to meet the wishes of the country members down for the polo. Here, again, there was a very poor response by Old Boys, and it was largely due to the presence of others that the Memorial Grounds will benefit to the extent of some £35.

in I ast year's Report, in School Register was completed and distributed. Innumerable letters have been received from Old Boys, speaking in glowing terms of its interest and usefulness. On Mr. Davies' shoulders fell the major portion of the work.

8. The Old Boys' Union Scholarships were awarded to S. C. Begbie and J. M. Dixon. Begbie is a Prefect, a member of the 1st XI. and 1st XV., and passed the Leaving Certificate in 1927. Dixon is a member of the 1st XI., Captain of

the 2nd XV., and passed the Intermediate Certificate in 1926.

9. The School is to be congratulated on its extraordinary success at the Boat Race. Letters of congratulation were showered upon the Union from all the G.P.S. and the Old Melburnians resident in Sydney. In recognition of the event, your Committee opened a fund to defray the expense necessary to make a presentation to the members of the Eight of their cars. and the rudder to the coxswain, with the colours and names inscribed. In August. your President handed these over to the erew before the assembled School as a gift on behalf of the Union. The School is also to be congratulated upon the success of its rifle teams. The First Team won: (1) G.P.S. Premiership, carrying with it the Schools' Challenge Shield, (2) Rawson Cup, (3) N.R.A. Shield. The Second Team tied with T.K.S., each scoring 512 points, with 29 central bulls.

10. Mr. N. Y. Deane was nominated by your Committee as a Vice-President of the G.P.S. Association to represent this Union, and was duly elected by the Association.

11. During the year Mr. N. R. Conroy-resigned from the position of Hon. Secretary, owing to pressure of business, and Mr. A. H. Curlewis was elected to fill the office. Mr. Couroy's resignation was accepted with regret, as he had given several years' service to the Union in that position. Messrs. Cowlishaw and Warden resigned from the Committee in February and June respectively, and their positions were filled by Messrs. Conroy and Crane; the latter was for several years Secretary prior to his absence in England.

The Annual Meeting of the Old Boys' Club was held at the Club on Wednesday, March 13, and was well attended by members. The fifth Annual Report was as follows:—

During the year the Club has made steady progress, and the present scheme under which the Club has combined for certain purposes with Newington College, Sydney Grammar School, The King's School and The Scots' College, while retaining its separate identity, has continued to work well, and the most friendly relations have continued to exist with the other Clubs. The Board of Directors of School Clubs Ltd. realise that it would be an advantage to enlarge the present common rooms and dressing rooms, but it is doubtful if School Clubs Ltd. is in a position at present to lease any further accommodation.

In the meantime a Building Fund has been started, which will be fed by annual contributions from the Clubs, and should grow steadily; and it is hoped that the Company will eventually be in a position to build its own Club premises. The present accommodation is a great advance on the first premises occupied by the Club, and the Club has had no occasion to regret its decision to join in the combined scheme with the Clubs of the other Schools.

At the close of the year there were 642 members including honorary and associate members.

During the year Mr. Dudley Williams and Dr. F. G. A. Pockley have acted as Directors of School Clubs Ltd., and Mr. A. N. Harding has been a member of the House Committee.
