

At the New South Wales Amateur Athletic Championship Meeting in February, S. H. Suhan had a brilliant success. He won the 440 yards junior championship in 52\frac{2}{3} sees., and the 880 yards junior title in 2 mins. 1 sec., winning the latter by 30 yards and creating a State record. A. V. Maxwell at the same meeting won the junior championship in the 120 yards hurdles with a time of 16\frac{1}{3} sees., one-fifth of a second above his previous best time, which was a record for the State. Both ran as members of the Northern Suburbs Athletic Club.

DEBATING NOTES.

This term Mr. Eldershaw found himself obliged to give up an active interest in debating, through pressure of other activities. His place has been taken by Mr. McAuley, and we have lost nothing by this change.

The membership this year has been most satisfactory, and we are faced with the problem of how to give each speaker sufficient practice, for only six can speak in each debate. The debates thus far have been on set or prepared subjects, in order that the newer members should have an opportunity of becoming accustomed to impromptu speaking by degrees. Next term impromptu debates, such as are held in the competition, will be held.

The topics discussed have covered a wide range, including the usual ones of freedom of the press, democracy and the status of women, and, in addition, some more unusual and more difficult.

The competition debates begin early next term, and the choice of a team will present some difficulty, as a number of speakers have shown marked improvement during this term.

THE OCTET.

Eight items from "The Arcadians" have been practised this term, and a good deal of hard work has been put in by members at odd moments, several junior boys having learnt up their own parts at home.

Nine copies of the vocal score have been accumulated from various quarters; and also much manuscript work has been done.

After a few full practices early next term, we hope that this programme will be worth hearing. Three choruses will be supplemented by the Preparatory School "50" Choir.



At our first mid-day concert this year on Friday, February 23, Mr. Raymond Beatty gave a recital, accompanied by Miss Milson. Mr. Beatty's powerful voice and vigorous style has done much at Shore to dissociate music from the notion of effeminacy. Mr. Beatty was in very good voice. Next term he and the well-known contralto, Miss Heather Kinnaird, are to give a joint recital.

On Saturday evening, February 24, a party of senior boys went to the Independent Theatre in North Sydney to see "Our Town," by the American playwright, Thornton Wilder. All found the play very interesting and its dramatic novelties most refreshing. Incidentally, an Old Boy, Frank Monckton, was a member of the cast.

We held a recital of recorded music at our next mid-day meeting. The amplification was supervised by Daley & Scarvell, and the programme composed by Mr. McAuley. "Finlandia" (Sibelius) was followed by Haydn's "Trio in G Major," and then the famous duet from Mozart's opera, "Don Giovanni." The rousing tone-poem and the vocal music were well received, but the trio, perhaps not sufficiently amplified, exhausted the patience of several members of the audience.

On Friday, March 29, our visiting artist was Mr. Ulick King (baritone), who sang two groups of songs by English composers—an early Jacobean group and a modern group, each characterised by a complete fusion of words and music. Mr. McAuley accompanied Mr. King, and, between the songs, played a gavotte, which received an ovation. Many thanks to Mr. King and Mr. McAuley.

A second recital of recorded music was presented on Saturday evening, March 30, in the School Library, by P. W. S. Broughton and R. A. Merewether, who briefly introduced each piece with a remark or two to direct the listening. During the playing of items the lights were switched

off. A very well selected programme opened with Rossini's overture to the "Barber of Seville," and was followed by Mozart's "Oboe Quartet in F Major," Bach's "Toccata and Fugue in D Minor," the "Polka and Fugue" from "Schwanda the Bagpipe Player" (by Weinberger), concluding with Prelude to Act 3 of "Lohengrin" and the march from "Tannhäuser." Tre Club desires to thank warmly Messrs. McAuley, Gilfillan and Butler for the loan of records. Supper completed a very pleasant evening.

A party of 55 boys attended the Theatre Royal on Saturday evening, April 6, for the programme of the Gilbert and Sullivan operas, "Trial by Jury" and "The Pirates of Penzance." It was great fun.

At lunch hour on April 12 a group of enthusiasts presented "Campbell of Kilmohr," a tragedy of the Scottish Highlands at the time of the second Jacobite rebellion. Boarders' tartan rugs and dressing gowns served as insecure kilts, etc., and the soldiers were fitted out with uniforms used in the Anniversary Pageant. Although the parts were mostly read, as was the practice last year, the presentation did not lack a touch of realism, and certainly held the attention of a large audience. We hope to carry on this work next term.

Mr. Walmsley very kindly arranged a recital on the Chapel organ for Friday, April 27, by Miss Joyce Ritchie, a brilliant pupil of Mr. Faunce Allman and the 1938 Busby Scholar at the University of Sydney.

On Wednesday afternoon, May 1, a party of 27 boys attended the Young People's Symphony Orchestral Concert being held in the Town Hall and conducted by Professor Bernard Heinze. These concerts make an excellent contribution to the understanding, and hence the appreciation of symphonic music. We are grateful to the Australian Broadcasting Commission.

We concluded our term's activities with a lunch-hour concert on May 3, at which several boys and masters rendered solo items (piano, violin, accordian), and a song composed by a boy of the Upper School.

Next term we are looking forward to hearing Mr. Monckton's Octet in solos and choruses from "The Arcadians," and are arranging several talks and recitals by Mr. Lindley Evans, another visit from the boys of St. Andrew's Cathedral Choir, and perhaps a performance by the Scots College Orchestra conducted by Mr. Victor Massey.

DART CLUB

The Annual Exhibition of Art and Carpentry will probably be held, as usual, about the beginning of August.

There are now a number of active members in the Main School who can do good work. If each contributed two or three exhibits only, this would ensure a really successful show; but there need be no limit to the number of exhibits—the more the merrier. Colour work will be especially welcome, as there is generally not enough of this.

Please begin handing in work now—it is a mistake to leave it until the last moment, when often careless and hurried work is done, which does not do justice to the artists.

Large drawings in broad style will be more acceptable than those of the postage stamp size. Use dark pencils, or clean, strong colours applied with big brushes.

There has been a good assortment of pictures in the Art Club frames.

Members would do well to get leave now and again to visit the new classrooms to acquaint themselves with prints of famous pictures, which we are fortunate enough to have hanging there.

THE CHESS CLUB.

The Club has grown over the last two terms. However, the number of boys from the Vth and VIth Forms is still much greater than from the lower classes. There should be more younger boys, and their membership would be heartily welcomed. Boys from the Lower IVth Forms are particularly invited, as this is the stage to learn if they wish to become really good players. They need not be afraid, as the senior members are willing to teach them; there are books to study, and the competition is divided into two parts for them and the more seasoned players.

This term the meetings have been held as usual each day—for the first part of the term in the Library, and then for the remainder in Room 16. For the use of this room we are thankful to the master-incharge.

We now have five complete sets, and there are three very informative books that can be read by boys who have a knowledge of the game and

wish to learn more.

Next term we hope that some members will be able to lend sets, and we will also have those which will be given as competition prizes at the end of the year. We have not had any competition so far, as it has been difficult to obtain a proper organisation of the Club. During the next two terms we hope to hold competitions with other schools on Friday nights.

The position of president has been filled this year by A. T. Duffy. We are thankful to Mr. J. C. Pope for the book he donated at the beginning of the year.

SCOUT TROOP

The Scout Hut has not been used to any great extent this term because of a Life Saving course, which the whole Troop underwent. Mr. Williams, from the Royal Life Saving Society, instructed us. Training in Lieu of Camp.—As it was not possible to hold a Camp, a five days' Course of Training was undertaken. Cadets returned home at the end of each day, reassembling next morning, and being transported, free of charge, to the scene of the day's activities. Lunch was provided

Fire, Ground and Formations, Patrols, and Mutual Instruction in Squad and Arms Drill; (iii.) Guards and Sentries, March Discipline, Messages and Reports, Administration and M.I. in R.T.; (iv.) Bayonet Training, Theory of S.A. Fire, War Organisation, Weapons, Supporting Arms, and Protection; (v.) Attack, Defence, and Sand Table Exercises; (vi.) Map Reading, Field Sketching, and Vickers M.G.

Competitions.—All competitions are off this year. It is, however, proposed to have a contest along Kirby Shield lines with Knox.

Examinations.—The usual Course of Instruction for those seeking appointment to the rank of Cpl. occupied the first three parades of the year. One hundred and fifty presented themselves for instruction; 120 were examined, and the first 66 were declared to have passed. The year's rowing started with the Christmas Camp on 22nd January. The Camp was as enjoyable as usual. The Eight was selected fairly early, but it took some time to secure the best combination of boys for the two Fours. Throughout the term, training went on with very little interruption. Though we did not win the Championship, we won the five four-oared races in which we competed.

The Eight could fairly be said to be well up to the standard of the three crews which won in 1937-8-9. It was the heaviest which has ever been boated from the shed, and averaged a few pounds over 12 stone. It was very powerful and, at its best, was very fast. In training, it registered some of the fastest times which we put up on the Parramatta. It was not always, however, quite consistent in its rowing. It is always very difficult to blend together men who are of different physique, and it was by no means always that the crew achieved coherence at the recovery and on the last portion of the swing forward. last few years our crews have always made enormous improvement in the last week of training, but this year the improvement was not so rapid. It may be that the bad weather we experienced on the first three days of the last week During the same time, Grammar, however, impeded the progress of the crew. made great strides and turned themselves into a really first class eight. the race they obtained a lead at the start, and were able to get that little breather in the second half-mile which makes all the difference to the finish. In spite of efforts, we could not bring them back, and we finished in third place behind Sydney High School. The crew felt that it had a good row in the race, and had no deep regrets. After all, having won for the three previous years, we could afford to see the Championship go round.

The Fours improved steadily throughout the training, and both, but particularly the second Four, made great strides forward during the last week. In their races, both crews came away in the last quarter-mile to win by a length and a half. The third, fourth and fifth Fours deserve a great deal of praise for their enthusiastic work, often in difficult circumstances.



A Dance was held in the School Dining Hall on the night after the Boat Race, and was attended by a great number. Though the accounts are not complete at the moment, it seems likely that about £70 will result from it.

The rowing prospects for the future seem to be good. We should reap great benefit from the keenness and experience of the Fours who rowed so well this vear.

FOOTBALL.

At the time of writing the football season has barely commenced, and most of us are still rather conscious of this fact, with a good deal of discomfort in stiff and bruised muscles. However, with a few weeks of hard practices, we should be in better condition by the end of the term. Physical fitness is our object at present, and team building will naturally follow later.

We have a number of practice matches which will serve as useful testing grounds for aspirants to the various teams. The First Fifteen have a good nucleus of last year's team on which to build, but there will be keen competition for all places, as a number of younger players from last year's Seconds and Thirds are showing very promising form. The teams all have good records to live up to, but one and all hope to make the 1940 season even more successful.

GRICKET MOTES

Although we were somewhat hampered by a temporary shortage of grounds, the School cricket has been satisfactory this term. The outside teams have performed fairly well, especially good results being obtained by the under 14 teams, the 4th XI. and the 6th XI. Practice has been carried out keenly in all teams. The system of internal cricket has been changed—Form matches have replaced House matches. From day boys the House seemed to call forth little enthusiasm, and for some time it had been difficult to get full teams for afternoon matches. The Form organization has given a better result. The matches are more keenly contested, and there is now little trouble in fielding full sides. All available practice and match wickets were in continuous use throughout the term, and the opportunity to play was given to as large a number of boys as was possible with the accommodation at our disposal.

The First XI. finished the term four points in the lead in the G.P.S. Competition, but it hardly performed as convincingly as last year's team. We suffered from a lack of sound early batsmen. There were many in the team capable of dealing with bowling that had the edge off it, but only Dunsmore looked safe against the new ball. However, Emery's form improved so much towards the end of the term that it is hoped that he will do an important job as an early batsman next term. Wearne batted pluckily on several occasions, and has improved a great deal as a batsman, whilst Butler and Godwin proved reliable, when runs were wanted.

The bowling hinged round Wearne. He bowled with tremendous stamina and all his old skill. He usually got out the good batsmen for us, and he was never expensive. Read put up some splendid performances, and if he had been able to control his direction with the new ball he would have been more valuable still. Lang has developed into a good bowler, and should take many wickets next term. If Marchant was a little disappointing at times, it was only because we expected so much from his undoubted ability. He did not always bowl to his field, nor did he consider sufficiently the qualities of the batsmen against whom he operated. He suffered a good deal from fielding lapses, his own included. There is no doubt, however, that if he uses this term's experience wisely, he can make himself a very good bowler indeed.

On account of the slowness and clumsiness of two or three men and the essentially specialised ability of some others, it was an extremely difficult team to get the best out of in the field, and on several occasions it had Lang in trouble. Anyone who knew his difficulties must have been tolerant with him in the task, and in most cases he managed very well. Way's job with last year's first-rate fielding side was easy by comparison. Facile criticism of the distance some men had to change over did not take account of all the factors of the case, and,

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whether Lang's decisions were correct or not, they were at least always the result of consideration. The team decided early that some fieldsmen were very good, some were very bad, and that the way to make the best of things was for all to be very keen and very ready to support the captain. Of the individual fieldsmen, Deamer was outstanding in speed and versatility. Kraefft and Emery took some very good catches in the slips, and Godwin improved greatly during the season and is now a first-class outfield. Dunsmore's wicketkeeping was very good except in The King's match.

For the players all the games this term were pleasant and interesting. That against St. Joseph's was one of the most exciting the School has taken part in of recent years. Fortunes fluctuated on both days. On the first day we made a respectable score after a very scratchy start, and then St. Joseph's gradually overhauled and passed us, after they had seemed in danger of collapsing. The fielding, catching particularly, of both sides had made runs very hard to get. We started the second day 23 runs behind, and again plucky batting saved us after early failures. St. Joseph's were set 178 to get, and, when only one wicket was down for over fifty, looked like winning. A magnificent catch by Dunsmore on the leg side to dismiss Ryan, the St. Joseph's captain, was the turning point, and some good bowling by Read drove home our advantage. We won by 51 runs.

We were sorry not to have a chance on a dry wicket of chasing King's fine score of 256 against us, but glad that when rain did come it came properly. On a damaged wicket our chance would not have been good.

This proved to be by far the hardest match of the term. St. Joseph's had a powerful team, having back five good men as a nucleus for their strength.

Possibly the most pleasing aspect from School's point of view was the fine performances by the new men, who rose to the occasion splendidly, thus helping a great deal to pull the match from St. Joseph's grasp.

Lang won the toss, and decided to bat. Good bowling by Beath, a fast-medium bowler, who is particularly accurate and who can swing the ball both ways, and Matthews, a slow-medium left-handed in-swinging bowler, dismissed the side for 175. This score was mainly due to a fine fighting innings by Butler, aided by Emery, both of whom went in at a particularly bad time.

St. Joseph's first innings was marked by a particularly fine effort of bowling endurance given by Wearne, who captured 8 wickets for 54 runs. Even with this effort, the side managed to total 198, thus leading School by 23 runs. This score was mainly due to a fine innings by K. Ryan, the St. Joseph's captain, who scored 65.

Easter then intervened, and the match was continued on Saturday two weeks later. The day was again fine, but the first five batsmen again failed badly, leaving it to the remainder, who were new to the team. Emery played a solid, confident innings of 73, which included two sixes; he was aided by Wearne and Godwin, both of whom played the bowling with remarkable confidence considering the time at which they went in. These scores resulted in the total reaching 200, when, with a new ball, the last three wickets fell without any additional runs being scored.

With St. Joseph's only 177 runs behind, this did not look at all promising on the rather small Hunter's Hill ground. However, School rose to the occasion and succeeded in dismissing St. Joseph's for 127, thus leaving them the winners by 50 runs.

This success was due to the good bowling of Wearne and Read, and to the fine wicketkeeping of Dunsmore, who secured three wickets, thus taking five wickets for the match. It was a particularly exciting match, and even towards the end the anxiety on both sides was keenly felt.

Physical Training.—This has been held on Wednesday afternoons on the School Oval. We congratulate Sergeant-Major Davidson on the splendid results already achieved.

The Chapel.—At our special service on Fridays, the lessons have been well read, and the singing and responses have been hearty. Addresses have been given by Mr. Saxby, a former Headmaster of Sydney High School, and by the Chaplain.

Music.—After Easter the singing classes began again. About half the new boys were found to be able to sing fairly well. Several have joined the Chapel Choir. Mr. Arnold's class has been divided into two groups, each of which practises once a fortnight.

The "50" Choir has learnt three choruses from "The Arcadians," to supplement The Octet next term. They have also embarked on a programme of their own, which should be quite presentable by Term III.

Our swimming could be improved a good deal, however, as we were not very much to the fore in the Combined Preparatory Schools' Carnival, though individually our representatives performed satisfactorily.

Entertainments.—A most enjoyable hour's entertainment, both amusing and educational, was provided by a visiting actor, Mr. Peter Leonard. We all enjoyed immensely his extracts from Dickens, and the amusing and clever puppet show.

PREPARATORY SCHOOL CRICKET.

Preparatory School cricket has continued this term the series of successes begun last term. The First team has won all its matches, and the Second team all but one; the School is thus in a very good position in the Inter-Schools Competition.

The First team has usually played sound cricket; the bowlers could always be relied upon, but the best batsmen frequently failed. Fielding, on all occasions save one, was more than safe. Calling and running between wickets steadily improved during the term; while behaviour on the field and team spirit were on the whole excellent.

The Second team is not as pleasing as the First. Its bowlers not uncommonly lost their length, and often its batsmen were painfully slow and sedate when they might well have been quick and dashing. Fielding, on the other hand, has always proved very sound. This team had two main faults—a tendency, towards the end of the term, to think that they were unbeatable; and an inclination, on the part of some of its members, to forget that they were playing for the School and not for themselves. There is reason to believe that both these faults will be eliminated by the third term.

In the Third team there is a certain amount of promising material, but the incentive that match-play gives was largely lacking, and, although most practices were held on middle wickets, team spirit seemed to be absent.

The Colst played matches against the First Elevens of Cranbrook and Trinity Preparatory Schools, and, although these teams were superior to the Colts, the latter gave a good account of themselves, and should be a good team by the end of the year. Hyland, Lee and Davey batted well at times. West, Davey, Lee

and Hyland are really good bowlers. Blackett shows promise at keeping wickets. Fielding and running between wickets were poor—usual failings amongst beginners whose practices are limited.

The Trials played no matches, but Nelson, Lyall, Barnes and Lemon showed promise at practice.

Dr. Anderson, Mr. Blackett and Mr. Davey deserve our gratitude for various kindnesses to the Colts.

We publish below a letter received by the Old Boys' Union from the Headmaster:—

The President, S.C.E.G.S. Old Boys' Union, Box 1334 J., G.P.O., SYDNEY. 26th March, 1940.

Dear Mr. Hipsley.

In recent years I have sometimes found myself unable to enrol the sons of Old Boys. This has been not only disappointing to them, but also distressing to me.

The School has now, for some years, reached in numbers the full limit which is considered desirable for efficient organisation. Hence it is now necessary to make application in advance. In most cases, about twelve months' notice is sufficient, but two years' notice is safer.

There are many considerations to which full weight must be given before a boy can be accepted. It is not necessary to put these before you in detail, but

you will readily understand, for instance, that the upper forms will afford few vacancies in comparison with the Junior School and the lower forms of the main School. The age and standard of the proposed entrant, therefore, must be carefully considered before acceptance. There are other points of difficulty.

My object in addressing you is to suggest that this letter be circularised to your members, so that they may be sure that everything possible is being done by the School to facilitate the entrance of the sons of Old Boys, and to strengthen the association of Old Boys with the School from one generation to another.

An interesting newsletter is to hand from Newcastle—Alec. Forsythe the writer. He reports that J. F. Unsworth and B. H. Anderson, who are both Air Cadets, have been doing their preliminary training with the Newcastle Aero Club. J. M. Busby is an instructor at the Club, training cadets preparatory to their being posted to Air Force stations. He was previously the Club's instructor for their North-West circuit. Major R. H. Russell left Newcastle some months ago, and is now in Palestine with the A.I.F. Army Medical Corps.

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We received with sorrow news of the accidental death on 15th December of Captain Richard Gordon Dibbs at Ingleburn. He was a company commander in the Sydney University Regiment before he enlisted in the A.I.F., and was respected and admired by all the members of his unit.

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Kenneth A. Slessor has been appointed Official War Correspondent with the A.I.F. abroad. He left the School in 1918, and has since achieved considerable standing as an Australian poet, while pursuing the calling of a journalist.

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The leader page of the Sydney Morning Herald is regularly brightened nowadays by articles from the pen of G. E. W. Harriott, War Correspondent. He deals with the activities—military and otherwise—of the A.I.F. in Palestine, and his excellent style and descriptive ability make these articles most entertaining. When war was declared he sought to enlist in the A.I.F.—soldiering is in the Harriott blood—but soon afterwards he was nominated as War Correspondent. A member of the literary staff of the Herald, he now represents several morning papers.

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The Editor of *The Torch-Bearer* would be grateful to receive news from any Old Boys on active service. We have the makings of some very interesting war correspondents already, but more news would be appreciated, especially with regard to the Air Force and the Navy.

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Before war broke out, Morrie Myers was a very keen amateur wireless operator, and was in charge of the Wireless Reserve for New South Wales and Canberra. Early in September he was called up by the Air Force. He is now at Richmond, attached to the Headquarters Staff, with the rank of Leading Aircraftsman.

Some interesting letters have been recived from Bill and Jika Travers, and we republish extracts therefrom. During March, Jika was at the Middle East Tactical School, Egypt. He writes:—

LIEUT. B. H. TRAVERS.

I have seen the Scots Guards since I have been here, and they are everything Sgt.-Major Davidson cracked them up to be.

Bill has been playing football in Palestine. The Army plays in sandshoes and gets sore feet. "The ground is about as hard as North Sydney Oval, although moles soften it by burrowing down."

The Australian nGeneral Hospital is not very far away, and here a very interesting discovery was made yester-While digging a drain, the "wogs" (Arab workers) came across a heap of stones, which proved on further investigation to be a grave. This was about six feet below the present surface, and contained a coffin of lead. The A.P.M. set a guard over it and sent for an archaeologist. It turned out to be a Roman grave about 2000 years old; the date was on the side in fact-60 B.C. [We hope not in those words.-Ed. "T.-B."1 in the afternoon two more graves were uncovered, and it has now been established that the Australian General Hospital is situated on a Roman cemetery. How suggestive this is!

Jika Travers was captain of the Rugby Union team selected to represent the A.I.F. against the French Army in Syria on April 28th. A. H. Mack is stationed at Victoria Barracks, Melbourne, and is working on the design and layout of R.A.A.F. stations. He holds the rank of Flying Officer.

Flight-Lieutenant Sturt Griffith has had several hazardous experiences during his flying hours, especially in the direction of forced landings. In January of this year he was piloting an R.A.A.F. Avro Anson engaged in night exercises. The 'plane had to be abandoned by the crew after he had attempted for more than seven and a half hours to find his way through dense fog. The crew donned parachutes and leapt to safety as the 'plane crashed into a creek.

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Lieutenant-Colonel Keith Fraser will sail from Australia in charge of the railway units which have been raised for work with the A.I.F. He joined the Railway Service in 1912, and, with the exception of his years with the 12th Field Engineers in France during the last war, has been a railwayman ever since. When volunteers were called for the railway units for the A.I.F. he was in charge of the construction of the new Hawkesbury River Bridge, but he relinquished that task for war service.

Stop Press.—Both Bill and Jika Travers played in the A.I.F. Rugby Union team which defeated a French Army team at the Beyrouth Stadium by 11-5. It was a meritorious win, as the French team included eight internationals. Each brother scored a try.

OVERSEAS NEWS.

Tom Dunbabin was in Athens at the outbreak of war as the Assistant Director of the British School of Archaeology. He returned to England immediately to enlist, and has, we understand, been recommended for a commission.

Ian Esplin is a Flight Commander in the R.A.F., and was elected Captain of Rowing for the R.A.F. Initial Training Wing. As Ian is a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford, it is interesting to read his letters, postmarked Cambridge. But this is no ordinary war! One gathers from his letters that the youth of England is afire, longing to be doing something constructive.

We reported in the last issue that Dr. Ivan Page was the first Old Boy to leave Australia for active service overseas. Another Old Boy, Dr. Stanley Bellmaine, dux of the School and cox of the eight in 1926, who was studying in London at the outbreak of war, joined the British Army Medical Corps, and has been in France for some time.

The Editor of these Notes regrets that the fourth Annual Dinner of the United Kingdom branch was not reported in the December issue. It was held at the Bristol Grill, and those present included Matthew J. Dawson (President), Jesse Bishop (Secretary), and Messrs. Esplin, Fairey, Finlay, Gowing, Hislop, Minton-Taylor, Moran, Pain, Ross-Smith, Shirley and Walker. The toast of "The Old Boys' Union" was proposed by A. M. Ross-Smith in an extremely entertaining speech. Unfortunately the Lord Chamberlain's regulations prevented our correspondent from reporting it fully. Ross-Smith's job is the "dissemination of information," which he assures us is something quite different from propaganda.

R. Minton-Taylor has joined His Majesty's Forces, and, as far as we know, is situated at the Isle of Wight with the 87th Light A.A. Battery, R.A.

John H. C. Read, of Singapore, was appointed Lieutenant Commander of the Straits Settlements R.N.V.R. last year, and on the outbreak of war was called up for active service with the Royal Navy. Patrol and minesweeping duties form the majority part of the activities upon which such people are engaged.

William Isbister, who left these shores in June, 1938, returned last February by the "Niagara" via America. While in England he was with the De Havilland Aircraft Company at Hatfield. He left Liverpool on the "Samaria," but after about twelve hours out they collided with another vessel, wrecking more than half the lifeboats, and were compelled to return to port. He finally embarked on the "Georgic," another Cunarder, and there met L. Buntyne, who was the "one-gun crew" of that liner. Isbister is now at the De Havilland Factory which was recently opened at Mascot.

C. R. Roberts, who is with the Bank of New South Wales, Suva, recently returned to Suva after three months' camp in New Zealand.

Jack Harricks returned early in the year from a trip abroad occupying about a year, during which time he managed to see a lot of England. His Continental exploration was rudely curtailed by a European dictator who shall remain anonymous!

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Mrs. Hodges and her sister, Miss Hawtrey, sailed for England via America last month. They propose to spend a short time in England and America, and then return to their home in Datchet, near Windsor. We trust that their voyage will be accompanied by a minimum of anxiety and a maximum of safety.

INTERSTATE NEWS.

South Australia.—We are grateful to an old friend, C. V. T. Wells. for news of South Australian Old Boys. A. G. Fox is a Major in the Artillery (Militia). W. H. Shepherd and J. Mehan are respectively President and Vice-President of the Legacy Club of South Australia. It must be almost unique for contemporaries at School to hold joint office in another State in an organisation such as the Legacy Club.

E. Chaseling is the Australian Operations Manager for Guinea Airways. Another Old Boy, C. Mocatta, is a pastoralist at Salisbury, S.A. Reg. Walker, whose regular globe trotting has been arbitrarily interfered with by the Führer, is anchored in Adelaide for the present. He is on the Executive of the Navy League (S.A. Division).

The Annual Dinner for South Australian Old Boys will be held on the 11th May. We wish them success.

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Victoria.—J. C. Nield is the Principal of Koornong School at Warrandyte, Victoria. He and his wife started this school during 1939, and the new system of education practised there has had excellent results. Extensive alterations and additions to the school have already been built.

Our diligent Victorian representative, Major L. H. Lemaire, is leaving Australia shortly as Camp Commandant, Corps H.Q., A.I.F. Godfrey Hawker has already sailed as D.A.P.M. 6th Division. Queensland.—A. J. Mansfield, an Old Boy of the School and an LL.B. of Sydney University, has been appointed to the Bench of the Supreme Court of Queensland.

David Thurlow, who, having safely weathered Arts, is now doing First Year Law, was one of Sydney's delegates to the annual conference of the National Union of Australian University Students, held in Hobart during January.

Owen Edwards, also a third year Arts student proceeding to Law, was appointed Editor of *Honi Soit* for 1940. We trust that the heavy responsibility of that position will not prevent him from achieving merited success in the faculty of Law.

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Another Old Boy on the staff of Honi Soit is W. B. Pritchett, a subeditor.

Several Old Boys assisted the University Tennis Club to enjoy a successful season during 1939. Dave Walkom played in the Seconds, John Neil and Norm. Stokes in the Thirds, and Colin Swirles in the Fourths. The third team won their section easily, and Norm. Incidentally Norm. is now in the A.I.F., and will, we hope, become one of our most valuable "War Correspondents."
