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

Staff News.—It is learned that Mr. Butler, who left us last year and went to Malaya with the A.I.F., has joined a British unit and become an officer.

**Decoration.**—It was with great pleasure that we learnt during the term of the award of the D.S.O. to Lt.-Col. Robert Heathcote Russell, A.A.M.C., a member of this School from 1916 to 1918. The award was made for his work in Greece and Crete, where he was in charge of evacuating casualties from forward areas.

Geoffrey Cohen Memorial Prize.—A gift has been received by the School for the endowment of an annual prize, to be known as the "Geoffrey Cohen Memorial Prize." The prize will be awarded for general proficiency in the Upper Fourth form. Geoffrey Landas Cohen attended the

School from 1926 to 1929. He enlisted in the R.A.A.F., and attained the rank of Pilot Officer before losing his life in an air accident in August, 1941.

War Effort.—The School's war effort has continued satisfactorily this term. The total number of camouflage nets made and roped this term is, at the time of going to press, 302, as compared with 320 last term. The house with the best average per boy is Hodges, which has produced over three nets per boy; U.IV.R. heads the forms with nearly one and a half nets per boy. Daily collections total £80, while salvage has yielded £17, making the war fund's total for the term nearly £100.

Air Training Corps.—During this term arrangements have been made for the formation of a Flight of the Air Training Corps. Its training will be under the Flight Commander, Mr. Tiley, assisted by Cadet Corps and A.T.C. officers.

#### YOUTH PLAYS ITS PART: WAR WORK IN BRITAIN.

Nearly a million British girls and boys between the ages of 14 and 18 are connected with organisations giving direct or indirect aid to the war Younger children doing voluntary tasks in out-of-school hours number hundreds of thousands. Inquiries made by a London newspaper showed that most of the great cities in England had no idle youths. Birmingham, not one of the 65,000 young people on the Juvenile Employment Bureau books was out of work. Many boys are giving up halfholidays and Sundays to work on the land. Last year 4000 boys from 170 public and elementary schools worked in relays at big forestry camps. felling, cutting and stacking timber. Young farmers' clubs have been organised on a nation-wide scale: They consist of lads between the ages of 10 and 21, and each club carries out the task of buying and selling its own stock, keeping accounts and managing the farm. The Youth Service Corps has enlisted 250,000 boys and girls from 14 to 18 years. vast help to the war effort. Boys collect salvage of all descriptions. Scouts teach the Home Guard the elements of stalking and woodcraft: others assist the local authorities with evacuees, and work on the land. Girls help local authorities with their war tasks; they sew, knit and mend for civil defence and other workers; they look after children and evacuees, for women who are engaged in war work. Thousands of young people are working civil defence, carrying messages through air raids, helping to extinguish fires and rescue wounded. The youth of Britain is finding that there is a job of everyone in a total war.

### PAGAN ARMY OF YOUTH WHERE "GESTAPO" IS RECRUITED.

Hitler to-day commands the lives of millions of children. mands not only their physical lives; he has also taken their minds, forming them into a great force for his own infamous purposes. In 1935 Hatler said: "The German young of the future must be as hard as steel from the factories of Krupp!" He has taken from the youth of Germany the simple, happy ideals of honesty and kindness, leading youthful instincts into the path of war, conquest, fierce racial pride and belief in force. Under Nazi teaching, children learn contempt for home influence; they become ambitious to join the "Hitler Youth" to wear a uniform and be free to go out at night. And now, as Hitler's task of policing occupied Europe grows greater, it is necessary to bring in fresh recruits to the forces of the dreaded Gestapo (Nazi special police). They are selected from the ranks of the "Hitler Youth." These recruits are boys of 16 years or so, who have been trained from early childhood. anxious to justify their promotion from the schoolroom. They are fitted with their black uniforms, given revolvers and steel-lined whips. . . . . This is a brief sketch of Nazi youth to-day. Perhaps there are no sins blacker than those Hitler has committed against the children of Germany. No price can be too great to pay to ensure that such teachings will find no place in the lives of children of the British Commonwealth.

All Saints' Day was observed by the School on Monday, November 3rd. The Reverend W. F. Pyke, Rector of St. John's, Gordon, preached the sermon at the Service of Holy Communion, at which a very large number made their Communion.

The tenth Annual Service of Lodge Torchbearer was held on Sunday evening, 28th September. The Reverend Edward Walker, Rector of All Saints', Parramatta, preached the sermon. The lessons were read by Worshipful Brothers G. C. Turnbull and J. Carington Pope.

#### o: CAMOUFLAGE NETS.

Net-making has continued steadily through the term, the weekly output varying between 24 and 42. The grand total at the time of going to press was 661. There was then a good chance that the number would grow to 700 by the end of the term.

These results, although they are very good, are not as good as those of Term II. To some extent the relative falling off was due to the virtual withdrawal of the VIth forms and most of the U.IVth forms from the undertaking. They had the Leaving and Intermediate Certificate examinations to cope with. But there were occasions when work through the School fell away.

Of the forms, the best work was done by U.IV.R., which, up to the time when it had to go to the I.C. exam., had produced 34 nets—1.42 nets per boy. At the same date L.IV.B. was second with 26 nets, L.IV.C. third (20), and L.IV.A. (17) next. V.C. and VI.A. followed. Among

the Houses, Hodges had the best record, its total being 110, at an average of 3.33 per boy. School House (135) has made most nets, but its average was not so high.

In the making of the nets to date over four and a half million knots have been tied; 2500 lbs., or about 323 miles, of twine have been used, and more than eight miles of rope have been put round the nets.



On Saturday evening, October 11th, a party of 65 boys attended the Independent Theatre's production of Bernard Shaw's "Saint Joan." It was an unusual but very stimulating experience.

We heard Godfrey Stirling at the mid-day concert in the School House Prep. Room on Friday, November 21st. It was an half-hour of delightful singing, for Mr. Stirling possesses a voice of pure tenor quality, over which he exercises a masterly control. His programme was a varied one, ranging from oratorio and opera to light humorous modern English songs. We are very grateful to Mr. Stirling, and to Miss Chalmers, his accompanist. They have kindly promised to come again early in 1942.

We are also indebted to David Maddison, the brilliant young pianist, who came over from Sydney Grammar School to give us a recital on Friday, November 28th. His programme opened with the classical music of Chopin, Liszt and Schubert—ambitious works, but revealing remarkable technical skill and musical feeling in the pianist; and concluded with his own arrangements of two popular tunes.



CADET MARCH THROUGH CITY—OCTOBER 10, 1941.

On Wednesday afternoon, December 10th, the Club conducted a play-acting competition in the Independent Theatre, and so inaugurate the first of what we hope will be annual school play-days. Five plays were presented, including two especially written for the occasion—"A Lady at Last" by I. G. Ross (V.A.), and "To Have and to Hold" by Norman Cull (L.IV.R.). The other plays are "The Crimson Coconut" by Ian Hay, presented by Hodges House; "Bardell versus Pickwick" (adapted from Charles Dickens), presented by Lower IV.A.; and two scenes from Shakespeare's "Merchant of Venice."

On Tuesday afternoon, December 2nd, a party of 90 boys, mainly from the Lower Fourths, attended the Australian Broadcasting Commission's orchestral concert for young people, conducted by Prof. Heinze, in the Sydney Town Hall. The programme included the overture to "The Flying Dutchman" (Wagner), Liszt's "Hungarian Fantasie" (soloist, David Maddison), "Pizzicato Polka" (Strauss), "Danse Macabre" (Saint Saens), and "Polka and Fugue" from "Schwanda the Bagpipe Player" (Weinberger). It was an afternoon of music everyone enjoyed. The Commission is to be congratulated on the fine work it has done over the last few years to cultivate in the younger generation an appreciation of good music by means of these free orchestral matinees presented by Prof. Bernard Heinze.

This term a number of boys have taken advantage of the opportunity of attending the last five of the 1941 celebrity concerts in the Town Hall by purchasing the special unreserved season ticket covering the five concerts and offered by the Commission for the remarkably low price of 3/4. It is to be hoped that more boys will be able to attend these concerts next year.

# CADET CORPS.

The year has been one of good general progress, marked by great keenness and a willingness to endure long periods of training. Of course, there is every incentive to work hard. The training is all calculated to be of use to the soldiers; the value of Cadet work is demonstrated by the rapid progress Cadets make in the Army; and there are many immediate rewards for those who become Officers or N.C.O.'s. It is true that all cannot get the promotion that they would like, while at school, but it is also true that all receive N.C.O. training, and that the value of this training becomes apparent at a later stage. Many who have not risen very high in the Corps have progressed rapidly in the Army.

A move is afoot to make more immediate use of Cadets who have shown special aptitude. It is not possible to give any definite information under this head at the present time. However, many Cadet officers and senior N.C.O.'s have recently been interviewed by military authorities.

Maj.-Gen. H. W. Lloyd, C.B., C.M.G., C.V.O., D.S.O., Commanding 2 Div., inspected the Corps on 11 Nov. Gen. Lloyd was accompanied by Brig. the Hon. T. A. J. Playfair, D.S.O., O.B.E., V.D., M.L.C., C.R.A. 2 Div., and Brig. C. E. Cameron, M.C., E.D., Commanding 8 Inf. Bde., and Lieut. A. V. Maxwell. A number of parents and friends witnessed the proceedings. At the conclusion of the inspection, the General addressed the Corps. After making some complimentary remarks, which were very much appreciated, and drawing attention to the importance of smart personal appearance in its effects upon the state of mind of the soldier, the General dwelt on the subject of leadership. He said that it is not by the led that great deeds are accomplished, but by the man who leads them; that it was not the Carthaginians who marched into Rome, but Hannibal. The General urged all boys to develop in themselves the essential qualities of the leader. Music was provided by the Band of the Needless to say their presence made all the difference to the parade, and we are very grateful to them for their assistance. Kirby, whose gas demonstration last term is still fresh in the minds of all. was in charge of the amplifying apparatus. He found time to let off explosives at a critical stage of the proceedings. It was observed that the troops were steady under fire.

On Youth Day, 10 Oct., in connection with the War Loan Drive, over 2000 Cadets from non-departmental schools of the metropolitan area took part in a march through the streets of Sydney. Detachments were under the command of their senior Cdt.-Lts. or N.C.O.'s. In our case, Cdt.-Lt. R. Blomfield was in charge. The Corps was represented by three

companies of about 100 strong and a detachment that was part of a composite group. The parade was well carried out, and aroused a great deal of interest.

Eastern Command is playing a large part in the training of Officers and N.C.O.'s of Cadets. The S.O.S.C. conducted, on 19 Oct., a Field Exercise, at which a party from the Corps was present. During last holidays a School (No. 9 Course) was held at Long Bay Rifle Range. The permanent staff instructed Cdt.-Lts. and W.O.'s, who, in turn, instructed those of lower rank. The Corps personnel attending consisted of 7 Cdt.-Lts., 1 W.O. and 28 O.R. Another School, No. 10 Course, is set down for 6-15 Dec. To this we are to send 8 senior N.C.O.'s who will be returning next year. The syllabus of this School, and of one to be held next May, is intended to meet the requirements of candidates for commissions. One of the features of all these Schools is night work, of which we have so far been unable to take advantage.

It was decided to include Signal Training in the work of the Corps. With the assistance and guidance of the V.E.N.T.S., a Morse class was started this term. Sessions occur during parades, and at lunch time. The boys generally are very keen, and considerable progress has been made. Transmission was carried out, in the first instance, by Mrs. Thomas, an instructor in the V.E.N.T.S., but recently Mr. C. S. Tiley and some of the boys have been doing it. Mr. Tiley has taken over the supervision of the sessions. We are grateful to the V.E.N.T.S. and to Mrs. Thomas for their assistance.

Field Training in lieu of Camp was arranged to take place at Blacktown, as last year. A report on this activity will be published next term.


